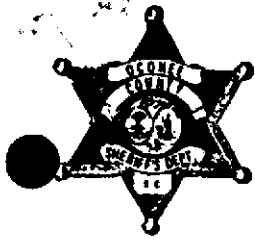

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR OCONEE COUNTY

NOISE CONTROL ORDINANCE

SECTION 1: DECLARATION OF NUISANCE AND PROHIBITIONS

1. Any unreasonably loud, disturbing, or unnecessary noise which causes material distress, annoyance, discomfort, endangerment, or injury to a person of ordinary sensibilities in the immediate vicinity thereof is hereby declared to be a nuisance and is hereby prohibited.
2. Any noise of such character, intensity, and continued duration which substantially interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of private homes by persons of ordinary sensibilities is hereby declared a nuisance and is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 2: ILLEGALITY

1. It shall be unlawful for any person to create or continue, or cause to be created or continued any such nuisance.
2. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether present or not, to allow or permit the creation or continuance of any such nuisance at or on the premises over which such person has dominion or control.
3. It shall be unlawful for any person to interfere with or obstruct an Oconee County Deputy Sheriff in the performance of his/her duties while enforcing the provisions of this ordinance.
4. For purposes of this section, "person" means any individual, partnership, association, or joint venture.

SECTION 3: ENUMERATION OF SPECIFIC ACTS

The following acts, among others, are declared to be nuisances in violation of this section, but such enumerations shall not be exclusive.

1. **Musical instruments, radios, phonographs, etc.**
The using, playing, or operating or permitting the use, play, or operation of any musical instrument, radio, phonograph, cassette player, compact disc player, television set, or other machine or device for the producing or reproducing of sound in such a manner or with such volume as to disturb the peace, quiet, comfort, and repose of persons nearby.

2. Loudspeakers and amplifiers.

The use of any loudspeaker or amplifier with such intensity that it annoys and disturbs persons in the immediate vicinity.

3. Yelling, shouting, etc.

Yelling, shouting, hooting, or making or causing to be made any loud, boisterous, and unreasonable noise which disturbs any other person in the vicinity.

4. Operation of vehicles.

The running of any automobile, motorcycle or other vehicle so out of repair, so loaded, or in such a manner as to create excessively loud noise or unnecessary grating, grinding, jarring, rattling or vibrating noise; the racing of any motor vehicle engine while such vehicle is not in motion, except when necessary to do so in the course of repairing, adjusting or testing the same between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m..

5. Horns and other signal devices on vehicles.

The sounding of a vehicle horn or signal device except as a danger or warning signal; the continued or frequent sounding of any vehicle horn or signal device for an unnecessary or unreasonable period of time.

6. Construction work.

The erection, excavation, demolition, renovation, alteration, or repair work on any building or building site, or the clearing of any tract of land between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. which results in excessive and disturbing noise, except in cases of urgent necessity in the interest of public convenience or safety.

7. Fireworks and other explosive devices.

Fireworks which are detonated within the exterior property line and in close proximity to a dwelling or occupied structure without consent of the person in control of the premises; detonation of carbide cannons, black powder or smokeless powder devices, or any explosive device or compound which when detonated causes a report which exceeds that caused by lawfully acquired fireworks and which disturbs the public peace.

8. Near schools, churches, and hospitals.

Any excessive noise in the vicinity of a church, school, other institution of learning, or court of law while the same is in session or near any hospital, rest home, nursing home, or residential care center which unreasonably interferes with the working of such institution or which unduly disturbs patients or residents.

SECTION 4: EXCEPTIONS

This ordinance does not apply to noise emanating from industrial and manufacturing operations, governmental activities, airports and aircraft, railways, emergency signal devices, firearms discharges as a result of lawful game hunting or target practice on property where it is allowed, agricultural activities, parades, carnivals, school band practice or performances, school or government sponsored athletic events, and public social events.

Additionally, this ordinance does not apply to noise between the hours of 7:00 a.m. - 10:00 p.m. which emanates from lawn and yard maintenance activities, tree harvesting or clearing, or explosives for construction and land clearing.

SECTION 5: ENFORCEMENT

The Oconee County Sheriff's Department will enforce the provisions of this ordinance. After receiving a complaint and upon a finding by the officer of a violation, or upon the occurrence of a violation in the officer's presence which would be in the public interest to quell, the officer may take any one of the following actions:

1. Warn the offender who will have the opportunity to immediately abate the offending noise without penalty. If the violation continues or reoccurs, the officer may cite or arrest the violator.
2. Issue a courtesy summons to appear in magistrate's court.
3. Make a custodial arrest.

Officers may consider the following factors, among others, when deciding the appropriate method of enforcement:

- number of citizen complainants.
- proximity and density of nearby dwellings or other occupied structures or areas.
- prior complaints regarding the same offender or same location.
- cooperation of violator and likelihood of compliance.
- nature and volume or intensity of noise.
- time of day.

SECTION 6: PENALTIES

Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall for every offense be punished by imprisonment in jail not exceeding thirty (30) days or by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00).



ATTACHED IS A LETTER OF COMPARISON OF THE INFORMATION SENT BY BOTH COMPANIES. MY RECOMMENDATION IS TO ACCEPT THE BID FROM A.I.D. AS THEY HAVE THE QUALITY AND FEATURES WE NEED FOR EVIDENCE INTEGRITY AND OPERATIVE SAFETY

The following is a comparison of the bids received for electronic surveillance equipment for Oconee County Sheriff's Office Narcotics squad.

Line item #1

We specified the use of narrow band dual front end receiver. This will allow reception of interference free communication from either the undercover surveillance transmitter or disguised miniature repeater.

A.I.D.
Complies

T.T.I.
Equipment is a wide coverage band receiver. This could allow under critical conditions, the reception of unwanted signals masking the reception from either the undercover transmitters or repeater.

Example:

A.I.D. receiver is like blinders on a horse, allowing it to see only a narrow field. While T.T.I.'s receiver is like a horse with no blinders on; it will allow the horse to be distracted by anything else around.

Line item #4

We specified a small, light weight, waterproof portable repeater with self-contained replaceable batteries. This would allow us unlimited possibilities of concealment.

A.I.D.
Complies both in size, weight, and waterproof construction and also the use of replaceable batteries.

T.T.I.
The unit is mounted in a container that is four times larger and heavier. It is not waterproof, and the unit still requires an additional, unspecified size and weight container for replaceable batteries.

Example:

A.I.D.'s unit could be placed underneath a pickup truck's seat using their concealed antenna in a coat hanger, or it can be concealed in a small tote bag on the back seat of the undercover agent's vehicle. It can also be placed outside, exposing it to the weather without possible damage to the repeater. T.T.I's repeater does not have any of these important capabilities.

Line item # 5

We specified a disguised digital pager transmitter with both voice and alert-distress capabilities in one package using a commonly available 9-volt battery.

A.I.D.

Provides a unit that looks like identical to a digital display pager that local paging companies in Oconee County provide. It provides the ability for us to monitor the conversation for agent distress, and at the same time, provides the agent with the capability to alert us when he is unable to verbally signal us of a life threatening situation. The pager also uses a common 9 volt battery that can be purchased anywhere and at any time of day or night.

T.T.I.

Provides two units: one unit is a voice pager and the other unit is a digital pager. The unit does not look identical to a pager that local paging companies in Oconee County provides. They use special batteries we are unable to find in Oconee County, and each unit does only one or the other function at a time, not both.

Example:

If the undercover agent is in a dangerous situation with the A.I.D. unit, he can both verbally alert us as well as signal us the danger. T.T.I's unit could present a problem if the agent uses only one of the pagers at a time.

We would rather use a unit that is identical to commonly used pagers which will provide both an agent distress tone and a verbal signal, especially when the agent could be in a life threatening situation.

Line items # 8 and 9

We asked for unique disguised antennas that would permit rapid installation without any antenna on outside of undercover's vehicle.

A.I.D.
Complies to our standards

T.T.I.
Provides only antennas that are mounted on the outside of vehicle, causing unwanted attention drawn to the undercover agent's vehicle.

Example:
We have found that if an outside antenna is mounted on an undercover agent's vehicle, the violators become very suspicious.

General specifications:

We specified identification of local field representative and experienced instructors for in-service training of the equipment.

A.I.D.
Provides both a field representative and a qualified instructor who is a resident of Oconee County.

T.T.I:
The representative and instructor has to travel from Maryland in order to provide training of the equipment.

Summary:

We have found A.I.D's equipment to be the standard that is used by professional law enforcement agencies in our state. The equipment is manufactured with the officer in mind, and A.I.D. provides small concealable packaging that fits into a wide variety of undercover situations. While T.T.I's equipment may be similar in function, it lacks the ability to conceal and disguise; these are two great necessities for the protection of our officers.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this order is to establish regulations, guidelines, and procedures for sworn officers who wish to engage in secondary employment that is conditioned on the actual or potential use of law enforcement powers.

The South Carolina General Assembly has enacted legislation authorizing law enforcement officers to wear uniforms and use weapons and other equipment while working off-duty private employment.

The Legislature recognizes that the mere presence of uniformed police officers performing private jobs during their off-duty hours adds substantially to the security of our citizens and extends the benefits of increased police protection at little or no additional public expense.

This policy provides guidelines to inform officers of the types of secondary employment which are appropriate and establishes procedures to maintain efficient operation of the department and ensure an effective level of protection for our community.

Policy:

A. Permissible Activities:

1. Secondary employer: deputies may engage in law enforcement-related off-duty employment for a profit-making, not-for-profit, or government entity when the performance of such duties is within the public interest and where there is no potential conflict of interest between duties as a Sheriff's Deputy and duties for the secondary employer.
2. Location: the employment must be within the geographical and jurisdictional boundaries of Oconee County.
3. Types of Services:
 - a. Security and protection of life and property.
 - b. Enforcement of state laws and county ordinances.
 - c. Traffic control and pedestrian safety.
 - d. Crowd control.

B. Restrictions:

The proposed employment must not be of such a nature as is likely to constitute a threat to the status or dignity of the law enforcement profession, create the appearance of impropriety, or bring disrepute to individual officers or the Oconee County Sheriff's Department. The secondary employment must not present a potential conflict of interest between duties as a Sheriff's Deputy and duties for the off-duty employer.

Examples of prohibited activities include, but are not limited to:

1. Acting as a process server, reposessor, bill collector, or other employment in which police authority might tend to be used to collect money or merchandise for private purposes.
2. Conducting personnel investigations for the private sector or any employment which might require the officer to have access to police information, files, or records. (Routine police functions which may require vehicle license, warrant or criminal records checks are exempted).
3. Performing tasks other than that of a police nature while in uniform.
4. Assisting in any manner case preparation in a criminal or civil proceeding.
5. Providing services for a business or employee group during labor-management disputes.
6. Working at any establishment selling beer, wine, or liquor for on-premises consumption. (In circumstances where the consumption of alcoholic beverages is secondary to the main activity and officers are requested for traffic or crowd control or general security, such requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis.)
7. Working for secondary employers that are regulated or must be licensed by the Sheriff's Department.
8. Soliciting off-duty employment opportunities.
9. Owning operating, managing, having financial interest in, or working for any private investigation, private security, or bail bonding business.
10. Profiting or attempting to profit (through brokering or other arrangements) from off-duty work of another officer.
11. Accepting lump sum payments for distribution to other officers working a detail.

The Sheriff may, at his discretion, disapprove any activity not listed above.

C. Limitations:

1. In order to be eligible for law enforcement related off-duty employment, an officer must be in good standing within the department, having at least an overall "satisfactory" rating for the most recent performance evaluation. Continued departmental approval of an officer's secondary employment is contingent upon such good standing.
2. Officers will not engage in any such employment while on suspension from the department.
3. Officers will not work off-duty while on medical or other leave due to sickness, injury, or disability or while on limited or restricted duty.
4. Approval for off-duty work must be granted pursuant to departmental regulations prior to employment of any officer.
5. An officer may work no more than a total of 64 hours in combination with regular duty hours in each work week, Monday through Sunday. No more than 16.5 hours, combining regular duty and off-duty hours, may be worked in any 24 hour period.
6. Work hours for all off-duty employment must be scheduled in a manner that does not conflict or interfere with the officer's performance of duty as an Oconee County Sheriff's Deputy. Excessive or inefficiently scheduled hours may also have a deleterious effect on an officer's personal or family life. The Department and the public have a right to expect officers to be in optimal physical and mental condition to carry out their duties. At all times the Oconee County Sheriff's Department will be considered the officer's primary employer. Off-duty work privileges may be revoked if officer performance is adversely affected.
7. An officer engaged in off-duty employment must respond to emergency or life threatening incidents in the vicinity if no on-duty units are available. The officer must return to his post at the earliest opportunity.
8. Requests from potential employers for officers to engage in off-duty work may be denied or revoked where it is determined pursuant to departmental policy that such outside employment is not in the best interest of the department or the public.
9. During scheduled regular duty hours, officers will not perform duties for compensation for any person or business, or through self-employment.

D. Regulations:

1. Officers engaged in secondary employment will conform to the same standard of conduct as applies to their on-duty activities. All departmental policies and procedures will apply. Disciplinary action will be taken for infractions of department policy.
2. The Sheriff, Chief Deputy or Uniform Patrol Commander may place special conditions on certain forms of off-duty employment, a particular employer, or special situations. Officers are to comply with those conditions.
3. Enforcement of the law, the primary duty of an officer, must be in the public interest and without regard to secondary employer interests. Officers will not act to enforce any rules or regulations set up solely by the establishment's management. Officers are not to allow themselves to be bound by a private employer's rules and restrictions which are in conflict with their duties as a law enforcement officer. Nor will officers comply with requests or demands of private employers which may violate State or Federal law or court precedents, particularly search, seizure, and arrest law. Such conflicts should be reported to the Uniform Patrol Commander, Chief Deputy, or Sheriff. Officers will take appropriate action only for the enforcement of the law and the preservation of peace, order, and public safety. Such actions may include, but are not limited to: mediation, diversion, admonishment, citation and arrest.
4. An officer has an obligation to deal with any and all police related matters coming to his attention, even if unrelated to the secondary employer. When any person threatens a breach of peace or violates the law, the officer may intervene to quell the violation, and make arrests if necessary. A transport officer may be called so that the officer may resume his secondary detail.
5. Officers working off-duty employment that requires vehicular and/or pedestrian traffic control will fairly serve the interests of all drivers and pedestrians, not just those entering or leaving the premises of the secondary employer.
6. Because of the benefits to the public and the department, the Uniform Patrol Commander will coordinate law enforcement related secondary employment. Interested officers will sign a register. Selection will be based on rotation and availability due to scheduling. The Commander will evaluate all requests from potential employers using previously stated criteria. The employer, site, designated duties, special problems or risks, and number of officers requested will be reviewed. Any changes deemed necessary must be made by the potential employer.

7. Compensation for off-duty work will be paid by the secondary employer directly to the officer. An officer who accepts secondary employment is required to report to the job unless sick or an urgent situation arises. In such a case the officer will notify the Uniform Patrol Commander who will find a replacement.
8. Employment in secondary jobs is voluntary. Potential employers are not guaranteed that an officer will be assigned whenever a request is made. Priorities will be assigned based on the public interest served.
9. Officers performing off-duty employment must be fully equipped with regular duty gear, including a handheld radio should assistance be required. Uniformed officers should be neat in appearance and project a professional image. Officers may drive department-issued vehicles to and from their posts. Vehicles may be used for limited escorts involving money or other valuables. Any employment requiring use of the vehicle for patrol purposes must be first approved by Oconee County Council pursuant to a contract. Requests for plainclothes officers must be approved by the Sheriff or Chief Deputy.
10. Officers are required to complete incident reports on all arrest activity which occurs during off-duty employment. Additionally, officers must report in writing to the Chief Deputy or Sheriff any incidents arising from or connected with their outside employment which might result in a complaint or otherwise adversely affect the Department or its personnel.

Uniformed law enforcement officers may wear their uniforms and use their weapons and like equipment while performing private jobs in their off duty hours with the permission of the law enforcement agency and governing body by which they are employed.

§ 23-24-20. Duties of employing agencies.

Each agency head shall determine before such off-duty work is approved that the proposed employment is not of such nature as is likely to bring disrepute on the agency, the officer, or the law enforcement profession, and that the performance of such duties and the use of such agency equipment is in the public interest.

Exoneration shall not occur until the matter has been considered by the solicitor of the judicial circuit where the death occurred and the solicitor has given an affidavit that after investigation he is convinced that the death was not caused by an unlawful act of the officer, or until the matter has been considered by a coroner's jury, or by a grand jury and the officer has been judged not guilty. If the officer is exonerated, he shall be paid any back pay due him.

Request # 1

The Oconee County Library Board requests Council's approval of our FY 93-94 LSCA Library Development Project grant. The overall purpose of this project is collection development. The focus is the adult non-fiction collection in the branch locations. Our goal is to provide a system-wide collection of recommended titles to be circulated from all locations using our request system and courier service. The grant is offered on a per capita basis, for a total of \$5,479.40 in federal funds. The matching \$3,833.60 will come from our FY 93-94 local funds for books.

The Board also requests approval of our FY 93-94 LSCA Adult Services Project grant. The purpose of this project is to continue our current Service to Adults project for a second year, to provide salary and fringe benefits for a professional Adult Services / Reference Librarian for 8 more months, from May through January, 1995. Grant funds of \$19,508 would be matched by \$13,005 in FY 93-94 local funds for books.

Request # 2

The Library Board requests Council's approval of the following library personnel policy for LSCA grants funded, full-time employees:

"LSCA Grants Funded Personnel - Full-time library employees receive the same benefits and privileges regardless of funding source, including enrollment in the S. C. State Retirement System, sick leave, vacation leave, holidays, and leave due to a death in the family. Grants funded library personnel are subject to Ordinance 80-2 as it applies to permanent employees, even though there is no assurance that the position will be permanently funded at the end of the grant."

The Board requests your cooperation to help us take full advantage of LSCA grant funds, specifically for salaries. Our salary grants have provided direct service to the public, in the form of courier, reference and adult services. This change in policy would not create additional expense for the County; however, it would allow the grant funds to be expended by the end of the project. Without this change, not only will it be difficult to keep any employee for any length of time, it will be nearly impossible to expend the salary funds by the deadline. We may lose the grants funds allocated for retirement, sick leave, and vacation leave.

RESOLUTION 93-26

WHEREAS, the number of unfunded federal mandates on counties and cities have significantly increased during the last decade, while many federal programs, which were made available to local governments to ease the burden of carrying out federal mandates, have been terminated or drastically reduced; and

WHEREAS, such mandates stem from federal laws and regulations that require counties to provide services and programs, and perform certain responsibilities without providing federal funding for such services; and

WHEREAS, by shifting costs to counties and cities, unfunded federal mandates breach the underlying principles of federalism which assumes a working partnership and shared responsibilities between federal, state and local governments; and

WHEREAS, American citizens are unaware of the impact of unfunded mandates on local services and their own local taxes; and

WHEREAS, risk assessment is an essential component to any cost-benefit analysis of mandates and should be included in all bills that impose mandates on counties and cities.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA urges Congress and the Administration to enact legislation that would relieve counties and cities of all obligations to carry out any new mandate arising from federal law, regulation or policy unless federal funds are provided; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress and the Administration are urged to enact legislation to reimburse local governments for the costs of complying with existing federal mandates; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress and the Administration are urged to include in any future mandate, a provision that requires federal departments and agencies to provide scientifically sound assessments of purported health, safety or environmental risk prior to the imposition of any new mandate on local governments; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA supports a "NATIONAL UNFUNDED MANDATES DAY" to be held **October 27, 1993**, during which county officials in all counties will be urged to hold press conferences in coordination with local and state officials to draw public attention to the problems imposed on counties by unfunded federal mandates.
