**MINUTES, OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING**

The Oconee County Council met Tuesday, March 21, 2000 at 3:00 PM in Council Chambers, 415 South Pine Street, Walhalla, SC with all Council Members and Acting County Attorney Timothy M. Cain present. The County Attorney came in later.

**Press:**

**Call to Order:**

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor-Chairman Orr who welcomed the guests and media.

**Invocation:**

The invocation was given by Mr. Hall.

**Public Comment Session:**

Mr. Bob Buse of Keep Oconee Beautiful Association (KOBA) addressed Council requesting the adoption of a proclamation declaring March 25, 2000 as "Clean Up Day" in Oconee County.

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that the attached proclamation be adopted.

Mr. B. J. Littleton addressed Council expressing concern regarding the Humane Society, the Magistrates and the fire trucks.

**Minutes:**

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 – 0 that the minutes of the March 7, 2000 meeting be adopted as printed.

**Resolution 2000-02:**

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that Resolution 2000-02, “A RESOLUTION HONORING DR. HARRY MAYS, SR” be adopted on first and final reading.

Supervisor-Chairman Orr then presented the resolution to Dr. Mays who expressed his appreciation to Council.

**Hospital Bylaws:**

Upon request of Mr. W. H. Hudson, President, Oconee Memorial Hospital, Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 3 – 0 (Mr. Hall and Mr. Thomas abstaining from the discussion and vote due to being members of the Hospital Board) that the bylaws of Oconee Memorial Hospital be amended to include the following language:

Section 7: The Corporate Compliance Committee of the Board of Directors. The Corporate Compliance Committee of the Board of Directors shall monitor and oversee the Corporate Compliance Program of Oconee Memorial Hospital and its facilities (the Program). This responsibility shall include reviewing reports prepared by the Corporate Compliance Officer regarding the Program, examining the unusual compliance issues should they arise, and overseeing the implementation of the Program. The Corporate Compliance Committee, as necessary, shall establish its own bylaws and/or charters to conduct its corporate compliance activities.

The Corporate Compliance Committee shall from time to time make recommendations and reports to the Board of Directors as called upon by the Chairman of the Board of Directors, or as the Corporate Compliance Committee shall deem necessary to inform the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors.

Section 8: Special committees shall be created as required by resolution of the Board. The purpose, duties and numbers of members of each special committee shall be specified in the resolution creating the committee. (See attached)

**Healthy Ventures:**

Mr. Frank Spann, Executive Director, Healthy Ventures, addressed Council regarding the goals, agenda and academic incentive awards of their healthy youth forum and other healthy ventures activities such as make a difference day, healthwise initiative and action team meetings. (See attachment)

Mr. Spann also informed Council that the next Healthy Youth Forum will be April 15, 2000 from 9:00 AM until 3:30 PM at Seneca High School.

**Ordinance 2000-04:**

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that Ordinance 2000-04, "AN AMENDED ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A LEASE AGREEMENT BY AND AMONG OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AS LESSOR, PINE RIVER PLASTICS, INC. AND CAROLINA FOOTHILLS, LLC JOINTLY AS LESSEE; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, PAYMENT OF A FEE IN LIEU OF TAXES" be adopted on second reading.

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that Ordinance 2000-02, "THE 1999-2000 OCONEE COUNTY SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ORDINANCE" be adopted on third and final reading.

**Ordinance 2000-03:**

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that Ordinance 2000-03, “ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE” be adopted on third and final reading.

**Ordinance 2000-01:**

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that Ordinance 2000-01, “AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 99-16, PROVIDING FOR THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS NOT TO EXCEED \$1,500,000 FROM THE FUND BALANCE ACCOUNT OF OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF FORTY-TWO (42) “T” HANGARS AND THREE (3) CORPORATE HANGARS AT THE OCONEE COUNTY REGIONAL AIRPORT SO AS TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF FOURTEEN (14) “T” HANGARS AT A COST NOT TO EXCEED \$496,122” be adopted on first reading in title only.

**Solid Waste Grant:**

Upon request of Ms. Melissa Brown, Grants Coordinator, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 – 0 that the attached FY 2001 Solid Waste Reduction Grant Application in the amount of \$2,563 be adopted.

**Rural Fire (Fire Trucks):**

Upon recommendation of Mr. Dewitt Mize, Rural Fire Marshal and Ms. Marianne Dillard, Purchasing Agent, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for four (4) pumper trucks be awarded to Advanced Fire at a cost of \$875,232 and the bid for two (2) tankers be awarded to Becker Fire Equipment at a cost of \$284,216. (See attached bid sheet)

**(Radio Equipment):**

Further, upon recommendation of Mr. Mize and Ms. Dillard, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for radio equipment for Rural Fire be awarded to BearCom at a cost of \$18,381.45. (See attached bid sheet)

**(Fire Fighting Equipment):**

Also, upon recommendation of Mr. Mize & Ms. Dillard, Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for fire fighting equipment be awarded as delineated on the attached bid sheet for a total cost of \$29,584.33.

**Clerk of Court:**

Upon recommendation of Ms. Sallie Smith, Clerk of Court & Ms. Dillard, Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for shelving for the RMC Office at the Pine Street Complex be awarded to Hart Information Services, Inc. who was low bid at \$15,072.60. (See attached bid sheet)

**Lunney Museum:**

Upon recommendation of Ms. Judy Havice, Lunney Museum & Ms. Dillard, Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 4 – 0 (Mr. Hall abstaining due to his wife being the secretary for Lunney Museum) that the bid for painting of the Lunney Museum be awarded to Creative Touch who was low bid at \$11,968.14. (See attached bid sheet)

**Vehicle Maintenance (Filters):**

Upon recommendation of Mr. Lee Davis, Vehicle Maintenance Foreman & Ms. Dillard, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for filters for Vehicle Maintenance be awarded to Anderson Auto Parts, Walhalla for one year with option to renew for four (4) additional years at a cost of \$16,316.31 for approximate quantities. (See attached bid sheet)

**(Batteries):**

Also, upon recommendation of Mr. Davis & Ms. Dillard, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for batteries for Vehicle Maintenance be awarded to Battery Specialists, Inc. who was low bid at \$7,070.70 for approximate quantities. (See attached bid sheet)

**Tourism Committee Appointment:**

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 – 0 that Mario Suarez be appointed to represent District III on the Tourism Committee.



**Road Abandonment:**

Mr. Norton, County Attorney, informed Council that the state had abandoned a section of roadway to the county several years ago and the only property owner on this section of roadway has requested that this section of roadway be abandoned by the county.

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that this request be referred to the Roads & Transportation Committee.

**Personnel & Intergovernmental Meet:**

The Personnel & Intergovernmental Committee scheduled a meeting Tuesday, April 4, 2000 at 5:00 PM in Council Chambers for the purpose of discussing proposed changes to Ordinance 85-1, "OCONEE COUNTY ORGANIZATIONAL ORDINANCE" and the Magistrate's Office.

**Roads & Transportation Committee Recommendation:  
(STIP Program):**

Mrs. Hughes, Chair, Roads & Transportation Committee informed Council it was the recommendation of the committee that the attached priority listing for the State Transportation Improvement Program be adopted and forwarded to Steve Pelissier at the Appalachian Council of Governments. This recommendation was unanimously adopted by Council.

**Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Recommendations:  
(Fire Trucks):**

The Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee recommended that the fire trucks purchased in the 2000-01 fiscal year be equipped with foam contingent upon the approval of the Rural Fire Commission.

**(Health Insurance):**

The County pay health insurance premiums for employees retiring from the county and having concurrent service with the South Carolina Retirement.

**Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Recommendations Continued:**

Further, the following health insurance benefit changes be made:

Vision Care:            Increase from \$100 to \$250  
                                 Laser surgery be covered at 50% up to \$1800 per employee

Dental:                    Increase dental from \$1,000 to \$2,500

**(Road Department Equipment Shed):**

The committee further recommends the equipment shed for the Road Department be bid as a design/build project.

**(Worker's Compensation):**

The committee also recommends that a member of the Finance Department, the Purchasing Agent, the Personnel Coordinator and the County Engineer conduct a study to determine the feasibility of changing the county's worker's compensation coverage.

All these recommendations were unanimously adopted.

**Budget & Finance:**

Mr. Hamilton, Chair, Budget & Finance Committee, informed those present that budget meetings and readings would be scheduled soon.

**Law Enforcement, Safety, Health, Welfare & Services Committee Meet:**

Mr. Hall, Chair, LEC Committee, scheduled a meeting Tuesday, April 4, 2000 at 4:00 PM in Council Chambers to discuss the SCDOT Share the Road Program.

**Tourism Committee Meet:**

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that the Tourism Committee schedule an organizational meeting Thursday, April 6, 2000 at 7:00 PM.


**Airport:**

*NOW THEREFORE, March 25, 2000 is hereby proclaimed "CLEAN-UP DAY IN OCONEE COUNTY".*


**KEEP OCONEE BEAUTIFUL**

**Amended and Restated**  
**BYLAWS**  
**OF**  
**OCONEE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL**  
**INCORPORATED**

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this Corporation shall be the "Oconee Memorial Hospital, Incorporated."

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Corporation shall be such as is expressed in the Charter of the Corporation.

ARTICLE III

SEAL

The official seal of the Corporation shall be the usual form of seals of corporations and shall contain the words "Oconee Memorial Hospital" in circular form with the word "Seal" across the center of the circle.

ARTICLE IV

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of this Corporation shall be October through September of each year.

## ARTICLE V

### MEMBERSHIP

The Membership shall consist of residents of Oconee County, at least eighteen (18) years of age, to whom membership certificates have been issued. Certificates of membership shall be issued to:

#### Life Membership.

- (a) All residents of Oconee County who have made contributions of ten dollars (\$10.00) or more since January 1, 1960, to Oconee Memorial Hospital, Incorporated, and whose names and addresses have been recorded on the books of that Corporation.
- (b) All residents of Oconee County whose names and addresses do not appear on record and who shall certify in writing that they have made contributions of ten dollars (\$10.00) or more to Oconee Memorial Hospital, Incorporated.
- (c) All residents of Oconee County who hereafter shall contribute the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) or more to Oconee Memorial Hospital, Incorporated, or the Corporation for such purposes as may be approved by the Board of Directors of the Corporation.

#### Annual Membership.

- (d) Any resident of Oconee County who hereafter shall contribute the sum of two dollars (\$2.00) to Oconee Memorial Hospital, Incorporated, or the Corporation, on or before January first, shall be recorded as an annual Member for the following year and shall be entitled to vote at the annual meeting for that year.

## ARTICLE VI

### VOTING AND QUORUM

All members who have been certified on or prior to January first shall be entitled to vote at the following annual meeting. Each Member shall be entitled to one (1) vote. Members must vote in person. Thirty-five (35) Members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of an annual meeting. The members shall vote for the election of the Directors of the Corporation.

The annual audit report and other reports relating to the operation of the Corporation shall be presented to the Members at the annual meeting.

## ARTICLE VII

### ANNUAL MEETING

Notice of the annual meeting shall be given to all Members by publication of time and place of meeting in the newspapers published in Oconee County.

The annual meeting of the Corporation shall be held on the third Thursday night in January of each year.

## Article VIII

### ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors shall be composed as follows: two (2) Members from each of the five (5) single-member election districts established for Oconee County Council; the Chief of the Medical Staff of Oconee Memorial Hospital, the Chief-elect of the Medical Staff of Oconee Memorial Hospital; the Chief Executive Office of Oconee Memorial Hospital, who shall serve ex-officio without vote; a member of Oconee County Council appointed by the Council Chairman; a Member of the Corporation elected at large by the Board of Directors to assure minority representation as to race or sex.

Prior to the annual meeting of the corporation, a Nominating Committee for nominating candidates for election to the Board of Directors shall be appointed, composed of seven (7) members as follows: one (1) appointed by the Medical Staff from its membership, one (1) appointed at large by the Board of Directors from its membership and one (1) from each of the five (5) County Council Districts appointed by the Board of Directors, which appointees from the



County Council Districts will be members of the Corporation but not members of the Board of Directors. The Members of the Nominating Committee shall be appointed for one (1) year terms, and shall be eligible for reappointment for no more than three (3) consecutive one (1) year terms, after which they may not be appointed for at least one (1) year.

The Nominating Committee will elect a Chairman from its membership, and the members of the Nominating Committee will be announced each year at the annual meeting. The Nominating Committee shall receive names of members of the Corporation to be considered for nomination as candidates for election to the Board of Directors at the next annual meeting. The Nominating Committee shall conduct an educational program for those members whose names have been submitted to it as proposed candidates for election to the Board of Directors. The nominating committee in December, prior to the annual meeting, shall nominate and publish a slate of candidates for election to the Board of Directors.

At the annual meeting of the Corporation, nominations for Directors to represent any area shall be taken from Members of the Corporation residing in that area.

Members of the Board of Directors' terms of office shall be four (4) years, with the exception of the County Council Member, the chief of the medical Staff, the chief-elect of the medical staff and the chief executive officer. Directors are limited to two (2) consecutive full four (4) year terms of office, after which they must retire for at least one (1) year. A Director who is designated to serve a partial term of less than four (4) years may be designated to serve two (2) consecutive full terms in addition to such partial term. Directors shall serve without pay for their terms of office.

No member of the Board of Directors nor the head of any department of this Corporation shall appoint to any position of department head or above any member of his immediate family to include his spouse, children, brothers, sisters, parents, father-in-law, mother-in-law, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, nieces and nephews, and for any person to be eligible for election to the Board of Directors, who shall have one (1) of the above named relatives employed by the Corporation at the time of nomination, such person must disclose the name and position of the relative.

#### ARTICLE IX

#### MANAGEMENT

All powers of the Corporation shall be exercised by and under the authority of the Board of Directors, and the property, business and affairs of the Corporation shall be managed under the Board's direction.

#### ARTICLE X

#### QUORUM OF DIRECTORS

The presence of a simple majority of the Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or called meeting.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### VACANCIES ON BOARD OF DIRECTORS

In the event of a vacancy on the Board of Directors, same shall be filled by the Board. A Director designated to fill a vacancy should meet the residency requirements and hold office for the remainder of the original Director's term. A vacancy should be filled within sixty (60) days of receipt of notice by the Board.

## ARTICLE XII

### MEETINGS OF DIRECTORS

The Board shall hold regular monthly meetings at a time to be determined as most convenient for the majority of the Directors. Special meetings may be held on the call of the Chairman, or in his absence, on the call of the Vice-Chairman, or on the call of any three (3) Directors. Directors shall be given written notice of each meeting of the Board and such notice shall set forth the time and place of the meeting and, in the case of special meetings, notice of the matters of business to be transacted. Such notice shall be signed by an officer of the Corporation and delivered to each Director either personally or by mail, telephone, or telegram to his residence or place of business as listed in the Corporation's records not less than forty-eight (48) hours prior to such meeting. Notice of any meeting of the Board may be waived by the execution of a written waiver of such notice, either before or after the holding of such meeting, by any Director, and such waiver shall be filed with or entered upon the records of the meeting. The attendance of any Director at any such meeting without protest at the commencement of the meeting shall be deemed to be a waiver by him of notice of the meeting.

## ARTICLE XIII

### OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

At the Annual Meeting the Board shall elect a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer from among the members of the Board. Those officers shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors and may be removed by the Board at any time for cause.

## ARTICLE XIV.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall be the presiding officer of the Corporation and shall preside at all meeting of the Board and of the Executive Committee. He shall be an ex officio members of all Board committees. He shall perform all duties incident to the office of Chairman and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board from time to time. The Chairman shall vote only in case of a tie.

Section 2. The Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman in his absence or in the event of his resignation, death or disability. The Vice-Chairman shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the securities and funds of the Corporation. He shall keep or cause to be kept, a record of all receipts and expenditures, always open to the inspection of the Directors, and make a detailed monthly report of the financial condition of the Corporation at each regular meeting of the Board and an annual report at the Annual Meeting of the Board. The Treasurer shall serve as Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Treasurer shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board. A summary of the annual report shall be published in the newspapers of Oconee County.

Section 4. The Secretary shall keep or cause to be kept, the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors and its standing committees; record the names of all Directors present at each meeting; notify all members of committees of their appointments; and notify all the Directors and members of the committees of regular or special meetings of the Board and

committees at least two (2) days before the appointed time for such meeting, and in such notifications, if it is a special meeting, state the matters for which the meeting is called. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board.

Section 5. The Executive committee shall be empowered to act for the Board on all matters that need immediate attention and shall report to the Board such action at their next meeting. The Executive Committee shall be composed of eight (8) members of the Board of Directors, one (1) of whom shall be the Chairman, one (1) the Vice-Chairman, one (1) the Secretary, one (1) the Treasurer, one (1) the chief of the medical staff of Oconee Memorial Hospital, one (1) the Chief Executive Officer of Oconee Memorial Hospital, who shall serve ex officio without vote, and one (1) the member of Oconee County Council as appointed by the Council as appointed by the Council Chairman, and one (1) additional Member to be appointed by the Board of Directors. Membership of the medical profession will be limited to no more than two (2) members at any one (1) time.

Section 6. The Finance Committee shall be composed of three (3) members. The duties of the Finance Committee shall be to examine the accounts of the Treasurer quarterly, devise ways and means of securing funds for the support of the Corporation, authorize investments and disbursements by the Treasurer and to attend to all financial interests of the Corporation.

Section 7. The Corporate Compliance Committee of the Board of Directors. The Corporate Compliance Committee of the Board of Directors shall monitor and oversee the Corporate Compliance Program of Oconee Memorial Hospital and its facilities (the Program). This responsibility shall include reviewing reports prepared by the corporate Compliance Officer regarding the Program, examining unusual compliance issues should they arise, and overseeing

the implementation of the Program. The Corporate Compliance Committee, as necessary, shall establish its own bylaws and/or charters to conduct its corporate compliance activities.

The Corporate Compliance Committee shall from time to time make recommendations and reports to the Board of Directors as called upon by the Chairman of the Board of Directors, or as the Corporate Compliance Committee shall deem necessary to inform the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors.

Section 8. Special committees shall be created as required by resolution of the Board. The purpose, duties and numbers of members of each special committee shall be specified in the resolution creating the committee.

Section 9. The Board of Directors may fill any vacancy in the various committees arising from death, resignation or otherwise. Any person so appointed shall hold office for the unexpired term of the member he is replacing.

Section 10. Meetings of the various committees shall be held as needed. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum. The presence of a quorum shall be necessary for a committee to conduct its business.

Section 11. All committees are subject to the direction of the Board of Directors and shall report their actions and recommendations to the Board at such time as they may be directed by the Board.

Section 12. All members of the Board shall be expected to attend at least fifty percent (50%) of all Board meetings. Absence from fifty (50%) of the regular meetings, within a calendar year or any three (3) consecutive unexcused absences shall cause the Members to remove the Director.

Section 13. No member of the medical staff of Oconee Memorial Hospital shall be eligible for election to the office of Chairman of the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE XV.

#### EXPENDITURE AND INVESTMENTS

All contributions or gifts to the Corporation shall be expended for the purpose for which the contribution was made. All trust and endowment funds shall be set apart as special trust funds, each of which shall be administered as directed by the creator of such trust. All such funds shall be held inviolate and invested so as to fulfill the purpose and intent of said trust.

#### ARTICLE XVI

#### DUTIES OF THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall select and appoint a Chief Executive Officer who shall be delegated the responsibility for overall management of the Corporation. He shall be given the necessary authority to effect this responsibility, subject to such policies as may be adopted by the Board or any committees to which the Board has delegated power for such action. He shall act as the duly authorized representative of the Board in all matters except those in which the Board has formally designated some other person or group to act.

Section 2. Specifically he shall:

- (a) Be responsible for implementing established policies in the operation of the Corporation.
- (b) Provide liaison among the Board, the medical staff, and the departments of

the Corporation.

- (c) Send periodic reports to the Board and to the medical staff on the overall activities of the Corporation, as well as on appropriate federal, state, and local developments that affect the operation of the Corporation.
- (d) Provide the Corporation's professional staffs with the administrative support and personnel reasonably required to carry out their review and evaluation activities.
- (e) Organize the administrative functions of the Corporation, delegate duties, and establish formal means of accountability on the part of subordinates.
- (f) Be responsible, except as otherwise provided by the Board, for selecting, employing, controlling, and discharging employees, and for developing and maintaining personnel policies and practices.
- (g) Establish such hospital administrative departments as are necessary, provide for departmental and interdepartmental meetings, and attend or be represented at such meetings.
- (h) Assist the Board in annually reviewing and updating a capital budget and preparing an operating budget showing the expected receipts and expenditures, and supervise the business affairs of the Corporation to assure that funds are expended to the best possible advantage.
- (i) Be responsible for the maintenance and insurance of all physical properties.
- (j) Perform any other duty within the express or implicit terms of his duties hereunder that may be necessary for the best interest of the Corporation.
- (k) Designate, in writing, other individuals by name or position who are, in order of succession, authorized to act for him during any period of his absence from the management of the Corporation.
- (l) Perform such other duties as the Board shall from time to time direct.



## ARTICLE XVII.

### MEDICAL STAFF

Section 1. The "Medical Staff of the Oconee Memorial Hospital" shall exist as an organized entity of the Corporation by authority of the Board of Directors. Staff privileges at Oconee Memorial Hospital will be construed to cover the acute hospital and any affiliate of the Corporation designated by the Board of Directors of the Corporation.

Section 2. The chief of staff will serve on an annual basis as medical director of the Corporation and its affiliates designated by the Board of Directors. The medical director will coordinate the activities of the medical staff with the Chief Executive Officer. The medical director will serve without pay.

Section 3. The Medical Staff Bylaws, Rules and Regulations shall constitute a continuation of the Bylaws of the Corporation and when approved by the Board of Directors are considered a part thereof.

Section 4. The medical staff is self-governing within the scope of authority granted it by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. The medical staff shall evaluate the professional competence of staff members and applicants for staff privileges. The medical staff shall be responsible for making recommendations to the Board of Directors concerning initial staff appointments, reappointments, and the assignment or curtailment of privileges. Staff appointments shall be for a period of two (2) years unless terminated for cause. Appointments to the medical staff are

made only by the Board of Directors.

Section 6. The Board of Directors, on the recommendation of the medical staff, may remove any member of the medical staff, or deprive any practitioner of the right or the privilege of the hospital whenever, in their judgment, the good of the hospital or the patient therein may demand it. In the event of any restriction or curtailment of privileges, the practitioner involved shall have the right of the hearing and appellate review procedure contained in the medical staff Bylaws.

Section 7. The medical staff as required by the Board of Directors shall conduct specific review and evaluation activities to assess, preserve and improve the overall quality and efficiency of patient care in the hospital. Their activities shall include:

- (a) Review and evaluation of the quality of patient care through a valid and reliable patient care audit procedure.
- (b) On-going monitoring of patient care practices through the defined functions of the medical staff, the other professional services, and the Corporation's administration.
- (c) Delineation of clinical privileges for members of the medical staff commensurate with individual credentials and demonstrated ability, subject to approval by the Board of Directors of the Corporation.
- (c) Judgment and assignment of patient care responsibilities to other health care professionals consistent with individual qualifications and demonstrated ability.
- (e) Provision of continuing professional education, shaped primarily by the needs identified through the review and evaluation activities.
- (f) Review of utilization of the hospital's resources to provide for their allocation to patients in need of them.
- (g) Such other measures as the Board may, after considering the advice of the medical staff, the other professional services, and the Corporation's administration, deem necessary for the preservation and improvement of the quality and efficiency of

patient care.

Section 8. The Board of Directors shall receive and consider the findings and recommendations emanating from the activities required by Section 7 of this Article. All such findings and recommendations shall be in writing, signed by the persons responsible for conducting the review activities, and supported and accompanied by appropriate documentation upon which the Board can take informed action.

Section 9. Unless otherwise provided in an employment agreement or other arrangement, the removal of a practitioner from a medico-administrative office shall have no effect on the staff membership status or clinical privileges of the removed officer.

A removed officer who believes that removal has subjected him to any adverse effects shall be entitled to the following procedural rights:

- (a) To the procedural rights provided by the employment agreement or arrangement; or
- (b) If there is no employment agreement or arrangement or if the same is silent on the issue of procedural rights, to the hearing and appellate review procedures as stated in the medical staff Bylaws.

ARTICLE XVIII

ARTICLE XIX  
CHECKS. DRAFTS, ETC.

All checks, drafts, orders for the payment of money, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Corporation in excess of \$100,000.00 shall be signed by two (2) officers of the Corporation who shall be designated by the Board of Directors of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XX  
INDEMNIFICATION

Section 1. Actions Other Than by or in the Right of the Corporation. The Corporation shall indemnify any person who was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceedings, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative (other than an action by or in the right of the Corporation) by reason of the fact that he is or was a Director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or who is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, against reasonable expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, penalties, fines and settlements, actually incurred by him in connection with such action, suit, or proceeding, if he acted in good faith and, in the case of conduct in his official capacity with the Corporation, he reasonably believed his conduct to be in its best interests. The termination of any action, suit or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction or upon a plea of nolo contendere or its equivalent, shall not, of itself, be determinative that the person did not meet the requisite standard of conduct set forth in the preceding sentence.

Section 2. Actions by or in the Right of the Corporation. The Corporation shall indemnify any person who was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, by or in the right of the Corporation, by reason of the fact that he is or was a Director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee or agent of another

corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, against reasonable expenses (including attorneys' fees) actually incurred by him in connection with such action, suit, or proceeding, if he acted in good faith and, in the case of conduct in his official capacity he reasonably believed his conduct to be in the best interests of the Corporation; provided that no indemnification shall be made pursuant to this Section 2 in respect of any action, suit or proceeding in which such person shall have been adjudged to be liable to the Corporation.

Section 3. No Indemnification if Improper Personal Benefit Received. No indemnification shall be provided to any person under Section 1 or Section 2 of this Article in respect of any proceeding charging improper personal benefit to him, whether or not involving action in his official capacity, in which he shall have been adjudged to be liable on the basis that personal benefit was improperly received by him.

Section 4. Indemnification Against Expenses. A Director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation who has been wholly successful, on the merits or otherwise, in the defense of any action, suit or proceeding referred to in Section 1 or Section 2 of this Article, shall be indemnified against reasonable expenses (including attorneys' fees) incurred by him in connection therewith.

Section 5. Authorization of Indemnification. No indemnification under Section 1 or Section 2 of this Article (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation unless authorized in the specific case after a determination has been made that the indemnification of the Director, officer, employee, partner or trustee or agent is permissible in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Section 1 or Section 2 of this Article. Such determination shall be made (1) by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a

quorum consisting of Directors not at the time parties to such action, suit or proceedings, or (2) if such a quorum cannot be obtained, then by a majority vote of a committee of the Board, duly designated to act in the manner by a majority vote of the full Board (in which designated Directors who are parties may participate), consisting solely of two (2) or more Directors not at the time parties to such action, suit or proceeding, or (3) by special legal counsel, selected by the Board of Directors or a committee thereof by vote as set forth in clauses (1) and (2) of this Section. Authorization of Indemnification and determination as to reasonableness of expenses shall be made in the same manner as the determination that indemnification is permissible, except that if the determination that indemnification is permissible is made by special legal counsel, authorization of indemnification and determination as to reasonableness of expenses shall be made in a manner specified in clause (3) of this Section for the selection of such counsel.

Section 6. Payment of Expenses in Advance. Reasonable expenses incurred in defending an action, suit or proceeding may be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding, after a determination made in the manner specified in Section 5 of this Article, that the information then known to those making the determination (without making further investigation for purposes thereof) does not establish that indemnification would not be permissible under Section 1 and Section 2 of this Article, and upon receipt of a written affirmation by the Director, officer, employee, partner, trustee or agent of this good faith belief that he has met the standard of conduct necessary for indemnification by the Corporation as authorized in this Article, and an undertaking by or on behalf of the Director, officer, employee, partner, trustee or agent to repay such amount if it shall ultimately be determined that he has not met such standard of conduct.

Section 7. Provisions Not Exclusive. The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under any bylaw, agreement, vote of disinterested Directors or otherwise, as a result of their action in either an official or individual capacity while holding such office and shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a Director, officer, employee or agent, and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such a person.

Section 8. Insurance. The Corporation may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or who is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, employee, partner, trustee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provisions of this Article.



ARTICLE XXI

AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These Bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed, and new and other Bylaws may be made and adopted, by a majority vote of the Board of Directors at any meeting, provided written notice of said meeting and the provision of the proposed change in the Bylaws of the Corporation shall be given to each member of the Board by the Secretary at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting.

Section 2. These Bylaws shall be reviewed periodically, revised as necessary, and dated to indicate the time of the last review.

# The Asset Approach

## giving kids what they need to succeed

**Why do some kids grow up with ease, while others struggle?** Why do some kids get involved in dangerous activities, while others spend their time contributing to society? Why do some youth “beat the odds” in difficult situations, while others get trapped?

Many factors influence why some young people have successes in life and why others have a harder time. Economic circumstances, genetics, trauma, and many other factors play a role. But these factors—which seem difficult, if not impossible, to change—aren’t all that matters. Research by Search Institute has identified 40 concrete, positive experiences and qualities—“developmental assets”—that have a tremendous influence on young people’s lives. And they are things that people from all walks of life can help to nurture.

Research shows that the 40 developmental assets help young people make wise decisions, choose positive paths, and grow up competent, caring, and responsible. The assets (see page 2) are grouped into eight categories:

- ▶ **Support**—Young people need to experience support, care, and love from their families and many others. They need organizations and institutions that provide positive, supportive environments.
- ▶ **Empowerment**—Young people need to be valued by their community and have opportunities to contribute to others. For this to occur, they must be safe and feel secure.
- ▶ **Boundaries and expectations**—Young people need to know what is expected of them and whether activities and behaviors are “in bounds” or “out of bounds.”
- ▶ **Constructive use of time**—Young people need constructive, enriching opportunities for growth through creative activities, youth programs, congregational involvement, and quality time at home.
- ▶ **Commitment to learning**—Young people need to develop a lifelong commitment to education and learning.
- ▶ **Positive values**—Youth need to develop strong values that guide their choices.
- ▶ **Social competencies**—Young people need skills and competencies that equip them to make positive choices, to build relationships, and to succeed in life.
- ▶ **Positive identity**—Young people need a strong sense of their own power, purpose, worth, and promise.

The asset framework is a framework that includes everyone. Families, schools, neighborhoods, congregations, and all organizations, institutions, and individuals in a community can play a role in building assets for youth. This brochure introduces the assets, shows their power and presence in young people’s lives, and gives concrete suggestions for what you can do to build assets.



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# 40 Developmental Assets

Search Institute has identified the following building blocks of healthy development. Each young person grows up healthily, caring, and responsible. Percentages of young people who experience each asset represent almost 100,000 11- to 18-year-olds who have been surveyed in 108 towns and cities in the United States.

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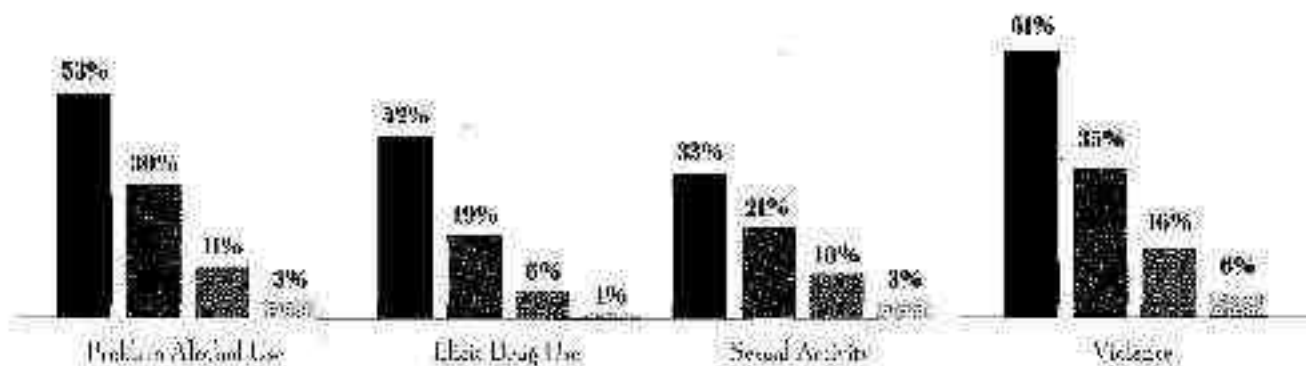
# The Power of Assets

On one level, the 30 developmental assets represent everyday wisdom about positive experiences and characteristics for young people. In addition, Search Institute research has found that these assets are powerful influences on adolescent behavior—both protecting young people from many different problem behaviors and promoting positive attitudes and behaviors. This power is evident across all cultural and socio-economic groups of youth. There is also evidence from other research that assets may have the same kind of power for younger children.

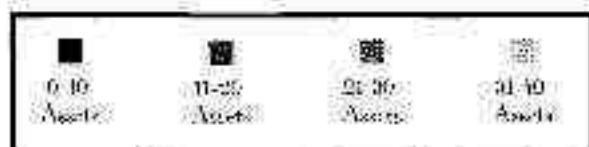
## Protecting Youth from High-Risk Behaviors

Assets also seem to help protect youth from many different harmful or unhealthy choices.

In this chart, these choices show that youth with the most assets are least likely to engage in four different categories of high-risk behaviors. (For definitions of each problem behavior see page 7.)

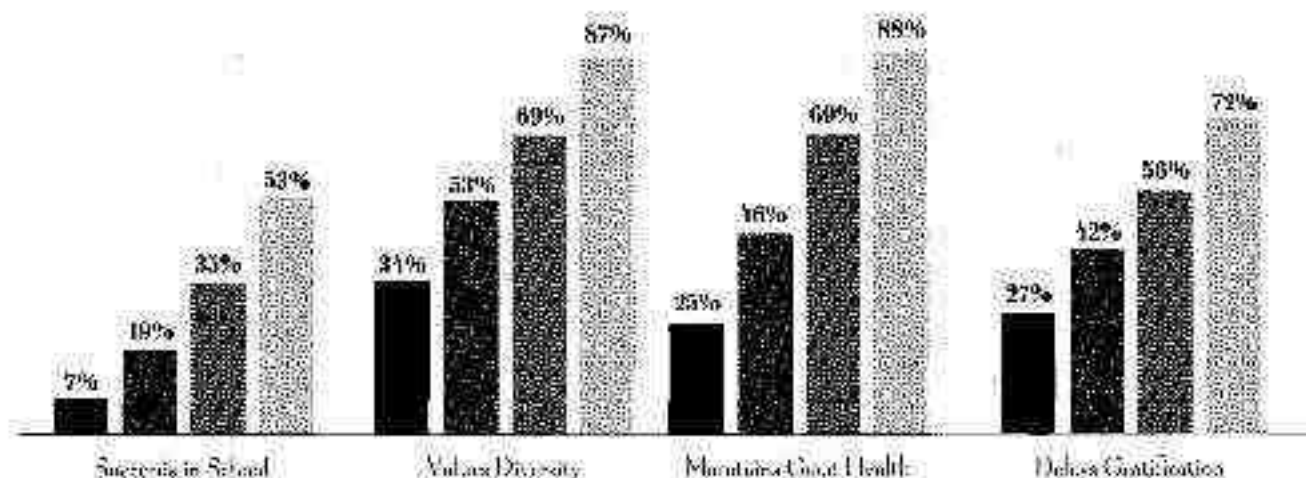


The same kind of impact is evident with many other problem behaviors, including tobacco use, depression and attempted suicide, antisocial behavior, school problems, driving and alcohol and gambling.



## Promoting Positive Attitudes and Behaviors

In addition to protecting youth from negative behaviors, having more assets increases the chances that young people will have positive attitudes and behaviors, as these choices show. (For definitions of each thriving behavior see page 7.)

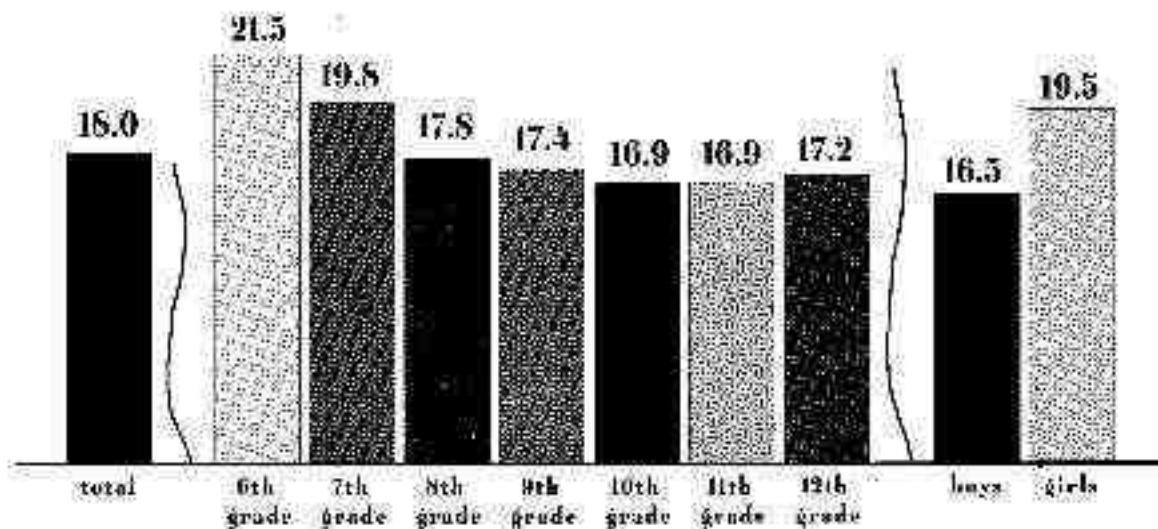


# The Challenge Facing Communities

While the assets are powerful shapers of young people's lives and choices, too few young people experience many of these assets. Twenty-five of the 30 assets are experienced by less than half of the young people surveyed.

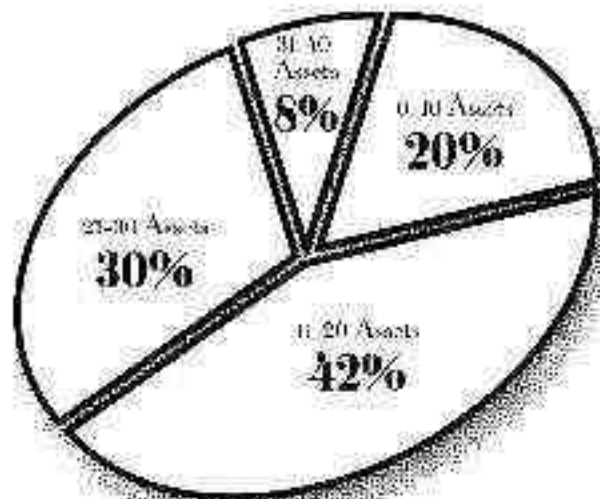
## Average Number of Assets by Grade and Gender

The average young person surveyed experiences only 15 of the 30 assets. In general, older youth have lower average levels of assets than younger youth. And boys experience fewer assets than girls.



## Youth with Different Levels of Assets

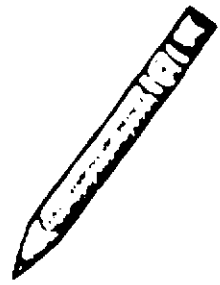
Ideally, all youth would experience at least 31 of these 30 assets. Yet, as this chart shows, only 8 percent of youth experience this level of assets. Sixty-two percent experience fewer than 20 of the assets.

# An Asset Checklist

Many people find it helpful to use a simple checklist to reflect on the assets young people experience. This checklist simplifies the asset list to help prompt conversation in families, organizations, and communities. *NOTE: This checklist is not intended nor appropriate as a scientific or accurate measurement of developmental assets.*



- 1. I receive high levels of love and support from family members.
- 2. I can go to my parent(s) or guardian(s) for advice and support and have frequent, in-depth conversations with them.
- 3. I know some nonparent adults I can go to for advice and support.
- 4. My neighbors encourage and support me.
- 5. My school provides a caring, encouraging environment.
- 6. My parent(s) or guardian(s) help me succeed in school.
- 7. I feel valued by adults in my community.
- 8. I am given useful roles in my community.
- 9. I serve in the community one hour or more each week.
- 10. I feel safe at home, at school, and in the neighborhood.
- 11. My family sets standards for appropriate conduct and monitors my whereabouts.
- 12. My school has clear rules and consequences for behavior.
- 13. Neighbors take responsibility for monitoring my behavior.
- 14. Parent(s) and other adults model positive, responsible behavior.
- 15. My best friends model responsible behavior.
- 16. My parent(s)/guardian(s) and teachers encourage me to do well.
- 17. I spend three hours or more each week in lessons or practice in music, theater, or other arts.
- 18. I spend three hours or more each week in school or community sports, clubs, or organizations.
- 19. I spend one hour or more each week in religious services or participating in spiritual activities.
- 20. I go out with friends "with nothing special to do" two or fewer nights each week.
- 21. I want to do well in school.
- 22. I am actively engaged in learning.
- 23. I do an hour or more of homework each school day.
- 24. I care about my school.
- 25. I read for pleasure three or more hours each week.
- 26. I believe it is really important to help other people.
- 27. I want to help promote equality and reduce world poverty and hunger.
- 28. I can stand up for what I believe.
- 29. I tell the truth even when it's not easy.
- 30. I can accept and take personal responsibility.
- 31. I believe it is important not to be sexually active or to use alcohol or other drugs.
- 32. I am good at planning ahead and making decisions.
- 33. I am good at making and keeping friends.
- 34. I know and am comfortable with people of different cultural/racial/ethnic backgrounds.
- 35. I can resist negative peer pressure and dangerous situations.
- 36. I try to resolve conflict nonviolently.
- 37. I believe I have control over many things that happen to me.

# How You Can Build Assets

## ... On Your Own

Everyone—parents and grandparents, grandparents, teachers, coaches, friends, youth workers, employers, youth, and others—can build assets. It doesn't necessarily take a lot of money. But it can make a tremendous difference in ensuring

confident, caring young people. What it takes is quality relationships, spending time together, and being intentional about instilling positive values and commitments. Some things you can do:

- ▶ Get to know the names of kids who live around you. Find out what interests them.
- ▶ Get to know what young people around you are really like, not just how they are portrayed in the media.
- ▶ Eat at least one meal together every day as a family. Take time to talk about what's going on in each other's lives.
- ▶ Volunteer as a tutor, mentor, or youth leader in a youth-serving program.

## ... In Your Organization

If you're involved in an organization such as a school, youth organization, congregation, family service agency, health care provider, or business—either as an employee or volunteer—you can encourage asset-building action within that organization. Some possibilities:

- ▶ Educate your staff, agency, employees, or customers about their potential as asset builders.
- ▶ Develop policies that allow parents to be involved in their children's lives and that encourage all employees to get involved with kids in the community.
- ▶ Contribute time, talent, or resources to support community asset-building efforts.
- ▶ Develop or strengthen programs and activities that build assets, such as mentoring, service-learning activities, peer helping, and recreation.

## ... In Your Community

Hundreds of communities across the United States are discovering the power and potential of uniting efforts for asset building. They involve people from all parts of the community in shaping and implementing strategies that will help all young people be more likely to succeed. You can increase inclusivity in the community by:

- ▶ Talk about asset building with formal and informal leaders and other influential people you know. Get their support for asset building.
- ▶ Conduct a survey to measure the asset levels of young people in your community. (Call Search Institute for information.)
- ▶ Develop opportunities for youth to contribute to the community through sharing their perspectives and taking action and leadership.
- ▶ Celebrate and honor the contributions of people who dedicate their lives and time to children and youth.

## Six Keys to Asset Building

It doesn't cost a lot of money or require special training to build developmental assets. Here are six keys to guide asset-building action.

1. **Everyone can build assets.** Building assets requires consistent involvement across the community. All adults, youth, and children play a role.
2. **All young people need assets.** While it is critical to pay special attention to those youth who face the least economically or structurally sound, all young people everywhere need developmental assets.
3. **Relationships are key.** Stronger relationships between adults and young people, among people, and their parents and caregivers, and children are central to asset building.
4. **Asset building is an ongoing process.** Building assets starts when a child is born and continues through high school to adulthood.
5. **Community messages are important.** Young people need a positive, consistent message about what's important and what's expected from their families, schools, practitioners, the media, and other sources.
6. **Intentional planning is important.** Assets must be continuously monitored across the years and in different life stages to ensure they



## About the Research in this Brochure

Search Institute has been studying developmental assets in youth in communities since 1988 using a survey called *Profiles of Student Life Attitudes and Behaviors*. In 2006, the current framework of 40 developmental assets was released. The data in this brochure is based on surveys during the 1998-97 school year of 20,662 6th to 12th grade public school students in 218 towns and cities in 25 states.

### How Problem Behaviors and Thriving Indicators Were Defined

Here is how each of the behaviors and attitudes shown in the charts on page 3 were defined in the survey. *Note that the definitions of high-risk behaviors are not rather high, suggesting ongoing problems, not experimentation.*

#### High-Risk Behavior Patterns

- ▶ **Problem Alcohol Use**—Has used alcohol three or more times in the past 90 days or got drunk once or more in the past two weeks.
- ▶ **Illicit Drug Use**—Used illicit drugs (cocaine, LSD, PCP or angel dust, heroin, and amphetamines) three or more times in the past 12 months.
- ▶ **Sexual Activity**—Has had sexual intercourse three or more times in lifetime.
- ▶ **Violence**—Has engaged in three or more acts of fighting, hitting, injuring a person, carrying a weapon, or threatening physical harm in the past 12 months.

#### Thriving Attitudes and Behaviors

- ▶ **Succeeds in School**—Gets mostly A's on report card.
- ▶ **Values Diversity**—Pleased to get to know people of other racial/ethnic groups.
- ▶ **Maintains Good Health**—Pays attention to healthy nutrition and exercise.
- ▶ **Delays Gratification**—Saves money for something special rather than spending it all right away.

# Developmental Assets: A Profile of Your Youth

Search Institute's framework of developmental assets provides a tool for assessing the health and well-being of middle and high school age youth. The asset framework represents a common core of developmental building blocks crucial for all youth, regardless of community size, region of the country, gender, family economics, or race/ethnicity. This report summarizes the extent to which youth in your community experience these assets and how the assets relate to their behavior. These 40 developmental assets were assessed in May, 1997 using the survey *Search Institute Profiles of Student Life: Attitudes and Behaviors*.

The developmental assets are grouped into two major types (see Figures 1 and 2). **External assets** are the networks of support, opportunities and people that stimulate and nurture positive development in youth. **Internal assets** are the young person's own commitments, values, and competencies. Figures 1 and 2 provide the percentage of all youth in your study reporting each asset.

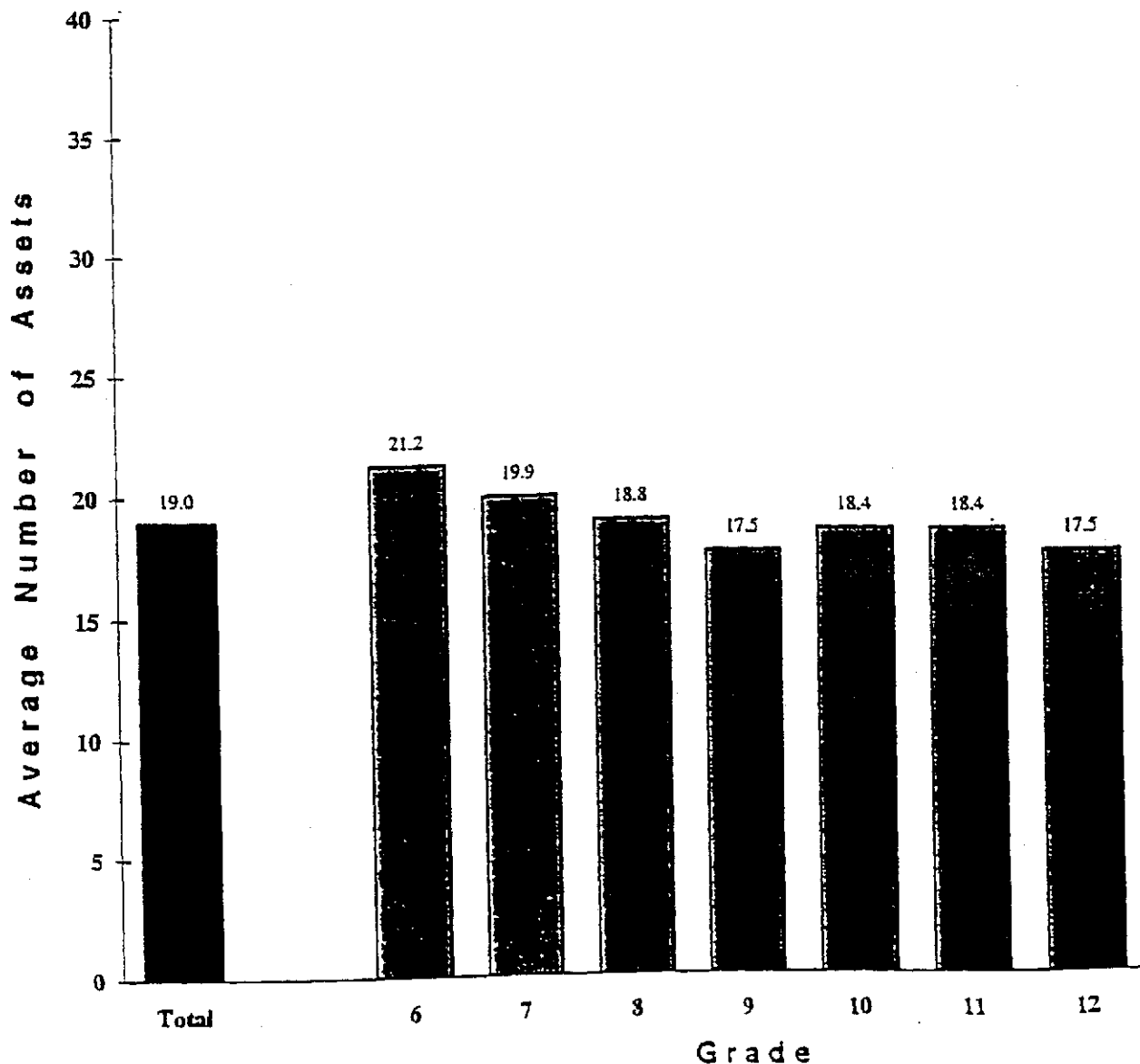

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Most young people in the United States—regardless of age, gender, or region of the country—experience too few of the 40 assets. Search Institute's research on adolescents consistently has shown a small, but observable, decrease in assets among older adolescents (9th- through 12th-grade youth) as compared with young adolescents (6th- through 8th-grade youth). If the average number of assets in some of your grades is particularly low compared to other grades, it may suggest a need to more closely examine what is happening at that grade level. Here is the average number of assets reported by youth in your community at each grade level.

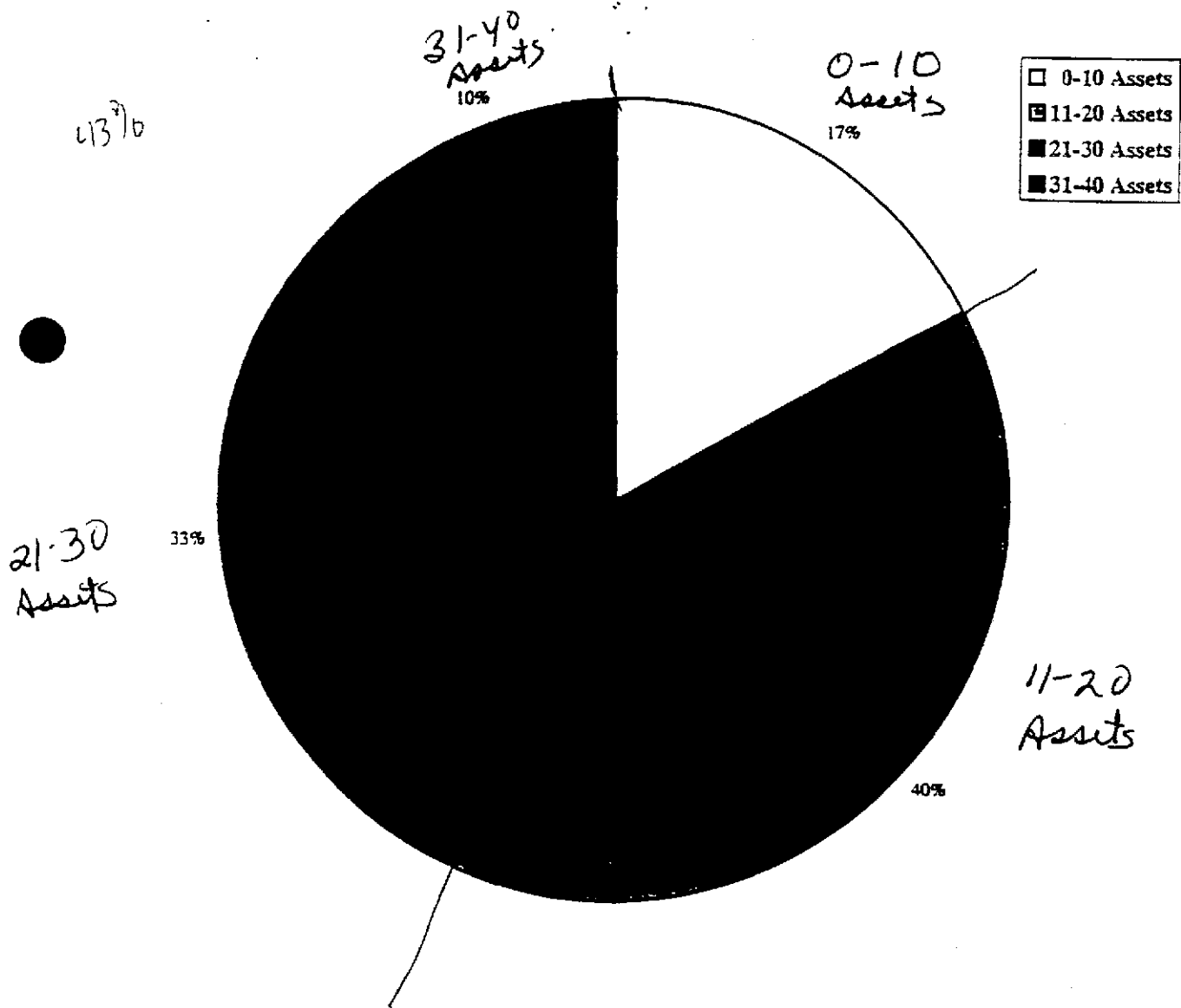


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## Figure 4: The Challenge Facing Your Community

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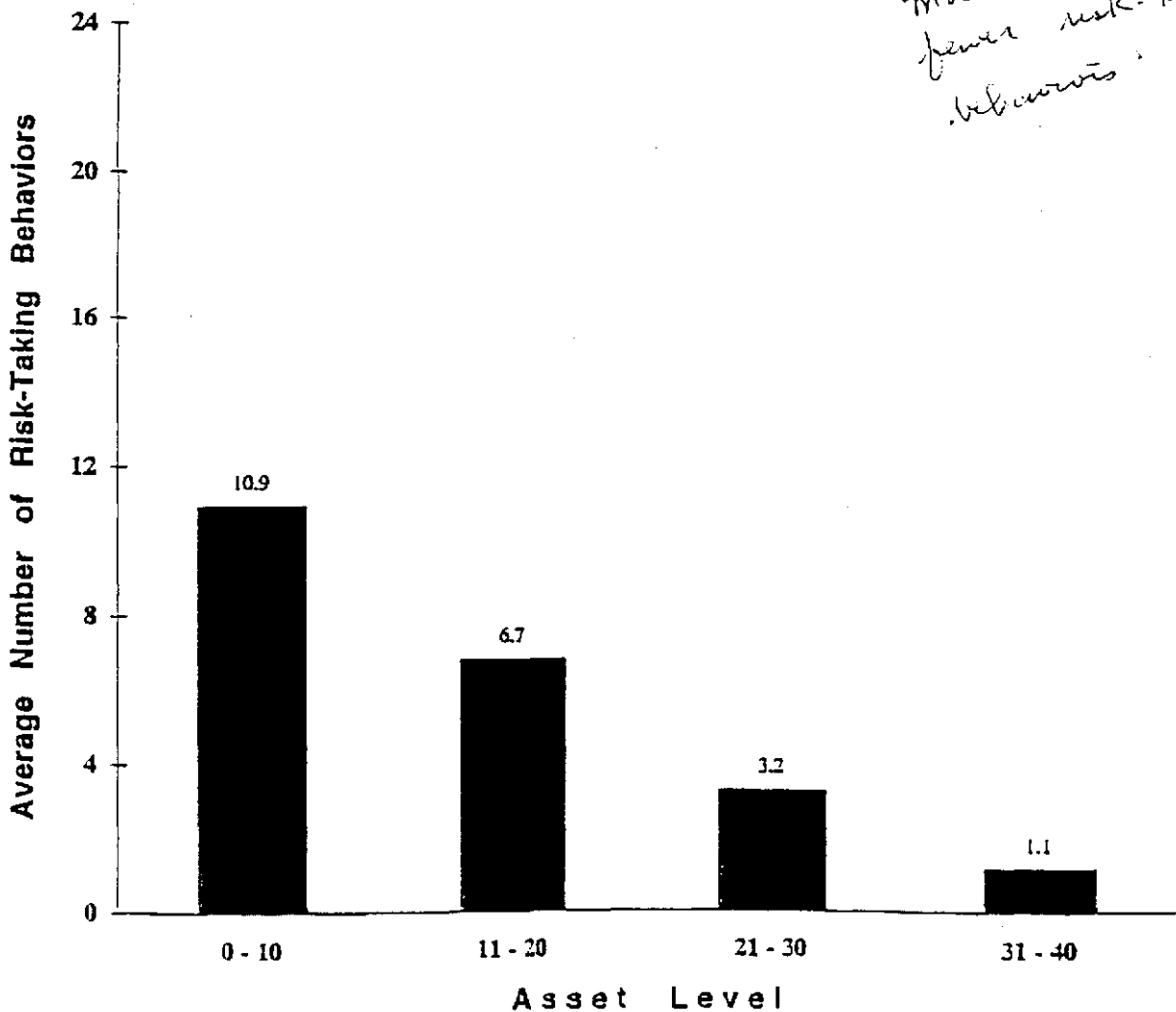
Ideally, of course, all youth would experience 31-40 of these assets. Each community needs to establish a goal for what percentage of youth it seeks to be at this level. This process can provide an important opportunity for creating a community vision for your youth. The figure below shows the percentage of your youth who experience each of four levels of assets: 0-10, 11-20, 21-30, and 31-40.





## Figure 5: The Power of Assets to Protect Against Risk-Taking Behaviors

This figure shows the power of assets to protect youth from risk-taking behaviors. Search Institute's research consistently shows that youth with higher levels of assets are involved in fewer risk-taking behaviors. Each vertical bar shows the *average number* of 24 risk-taking behaviors among all youth, grouped by asset level (0-10, 11-20, 21-30, and 31-40). The 24 risk-taking behaviors are: alcohol use, binge drinking, smoking, smokeless tobacco, inhalants, marijuana, other illicit drugs, drinking and driving, riding with a driver who has been drinking, sexual intercourse, shoplifting, vandalism, trouble with police, hitting someone, hurting someone, use of a weapon, group fighting, carrying a weapon for protection, threatening physical harm, skipping school, gambling, eating disorders, depression, and attempted suicide.

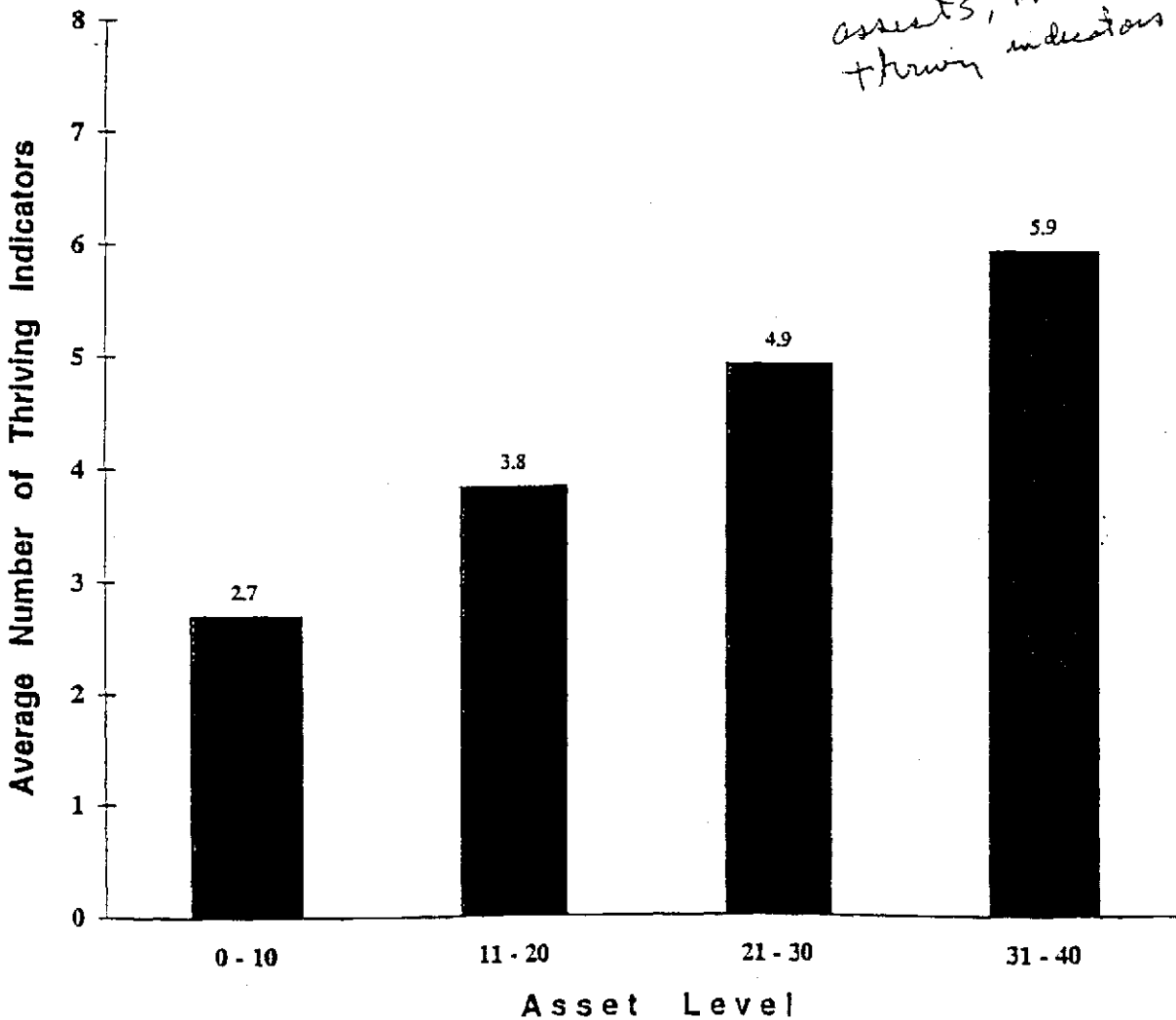


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## Figure 6: The Power of Assets to Promote Thriving Indicators

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This figure shows the power of assets to promote thriving indicators among your youth. Search Institute's research consistently shows that youth with higher levels of assets are more likely to report more thriving indicators. Each vertical bar shows the *average number* of eight thriving indicators among all youth, grouped by asset level (0-10, 11-20, 21-30, and 31-40). The eight thriving indicators are: school success, informal helping, valuing diversity, maintaining good health, exhibiting leadership, resisting danger, impulse control, and overcoming adversity.



# What Next?

## Moving from Awareness to Action

This report provides insights about the young people in your community and can be a powerful tool for community-wide discussion about how to improve the well-being of your youth. The good news is that everyone—parents, grandparents, educators, neighborhoods, children, teenagers, youth workers, employers, health care providers, coaches, and others—can build assets. Ideally, the whole community is involved to ensure that young people have the solid foundation they need to become tomorrow's competent, caring adults. Here are some suggestions for how to begin strengthening the assets among the youth in your community.

### *What adults can do . . .*

- Smile at every child or adolescent you see.
- Send a "thinking of you" or birthday card, letter, or e-mail message to a child or adolescent.
- Invite a young person you know to do something together, such as playing a game or going to a park.

### *What young people can do . . .*

- Take advantage of interesting and challenging opportunities through youth programs, cocurricular activities, and congregational youth programs.
- Get to know an adult you admire.
- Find opportunities to build relationships with younger children such as service projects, tutoring, or baby-sitting.

### *What families can do . . .*

- Model—and talk about—your own values and priorities.
- Regularly do things with your child, including projects around your house, recreational activities, and service projects.
- Talk to your children about assets. Ask them for suggestions of ways to strengthen theirs and yours.

### *What organizations can do . . .*

- Highlight, develop, expand, or support programs designed to build assets, such as mentoring, peer helping, service-learning, or parent education.
- Provide meaningful opportunities for young people to contribute to others in and through your organization.
- Develop employee policies that encourage asset building, including flexible work schedules for parents as well as other employees, so that they can volunteer in youth development programs.

**“AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 99-16 PROVIDING FOR THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS NOT TO EXCEED \$1,500,000 FROM THE FUND BALANCE ACCOUNT OF OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF FORTY-TWO (42) “T” HANGARS AND THREE (3) CORPORATE HANGARS AT THE OCONEE COUNTY REGIONAL AIRPORT SO AS TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF FOURTEEN (14) “T” HANGARS AT A COST NOT TO EXCEED \$496,122”**

**WHEREAS**, the Oconee County Council adopted Ordinance 99-16 upon third and final reading on December 7, 1999; and

**WHEREAS**, Ordinance 99-16 provides for the funding of the construction of forty-two (42) “T” hangars and three (3) corporate hangars at the Oconee County Regional Airport; and

**WHEREAS**, it has been determined that the construction of forty-two (42) “T” hangars and three (3) corporate hangars is not feasible at this time for the amount appropriated in said Ordinance, but that fourteen (14) “T” hangars can be constructed at a cost not to exceed \$496,122.

**NOW THEREFORE**, be it ordained by the Oconee County Council in session duly assembled with a quorum present and voting as follows:

**SECTION I:** It is hereby ordered that Ordinance 99-16 is amended to provide that fourteen (14) “T” hangars be constructed at the Oconee County Regional Airport from the funds appropriated by Ordinance 99-16 for such purpose(s) and that all unexpended funds remain in and/or revert to the fund balance account(s) of Oconee County.

**SECTION II:** All other terms and provisions of Ordinance 99-16 not modified directly or by implication shall likewise remain in full force and effect.

**SECTION III:** If any portion of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid by a Court of Competent Jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed severable and such finding shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance.

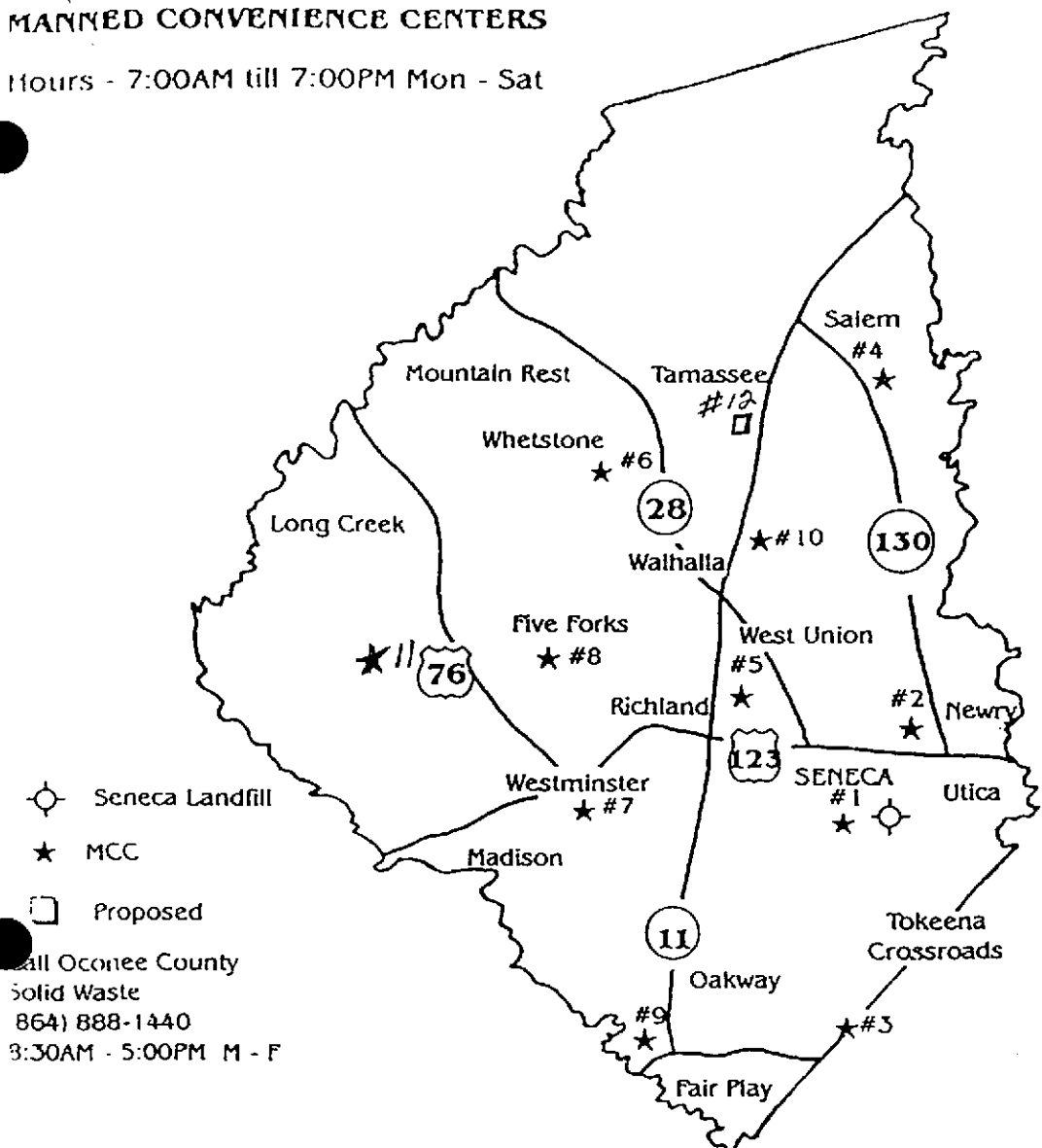

**10. Describe your recycling education efforts.**

Oconee County's Education Program includes personal visits to schools, churches, civic organizations, government functions and other gatherings. We provide tours of our Materials Recovery Facility, Transfer Station, Manned Convenience Centers and C&D Landfill. We use brochures to tell what can be recycled and how to prepare these items. We also distribute coloring books, recycling worksheets, FYF sheets for children and FYI sheets for adults. An eight (8) minute video that we produced is shown to answer questions and promote reduction, reuse and recycling. We run ads in local newspapers to promote our program and we have used radio spots. All of this, along with personal appearances by Oconee County's recycling mascot, "Chippy Chipmunk" has enabled us to realize significant growth in our recycling program.

**11. Describe the project for which grant funding is being requested.**

Oconee County Solid Waste, in cooperation with the Local Emergency Preparedness Committee (LEPC) which is comprised of the offices of Sheriff, Police, Fire, Hazardous Materials Team, Bomb Squad, Rescue Squad, Red Cross and various industries and businesses, is preparing to host our first Household Hazardous Waste Day. It will be held on October 7, 2000 from 9:00 AM – 1:00 PM.

Our goal is to publicize the event through newspaper advertisements, radio spots, water and light bills and flyers. We would like to distribute bumper stickers and plastic coffee mugs to the citizens that participate in the Household Hazardous Waste Day. These items will promote not only recycling but encourage anti-littering as well.

Having a Household Hazardous Waste Day will benefit our solid waste program by providing the citizens an opportunity to dispose of hazardous materials properly rather than putting them in their regular household trash.

As this is our first Household Hazardous Waste Day, it would be nearly impossible to estimate the tonnage of material that will be diverted from a landfill, the increase of materials being recycled or the decrease of waste material being generated.

Note: The items underlined are clarifications taken and not necessarily exceptions to the specifications.

Page 5 of the boiler plate, paragraph DELIVERY: We are taking exception to the 300 calendar day delivery. With the uncertainty of the Freightliner chassis delivery, we cannot guarantee this delivery. We will be quoting 300-360 delivery. This is however subject to change based on chassis delivery.

Page 5 of the boiler plate, paragraph LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: With the uncertainty of the Freightliner chassis delivery, we are taking exception to the \$100.00 a day penalty on the contract. There are numerous items that are purchased components such as chassis that have outrageously long lead times.

Page 7 of specifications, PUMP SHIFT: We will be proposing a air actuated pump shift. The air shift does not cause the "BUTT TOOTH" condition when shifting as often as an electric shift.

Page 8 of specifications, LEFT SIDE 10-1/2" SUCTION HEADER: The pump panel will not be top hatted.

Page 9 of specifications, INDIVIDUAL DRAIN VALVES: We use a combination of Class 1 and Akron Valves for the individual drains valves.

Page 10 of specifications, HINGED BI-FOLD ALUMINUM DIAMONDETTE CROSSLAY COVER: The "D" rings will not be supplied as they are not needed with our design.

Page 10 of specifications, OPERATOR'S CONTROL PANEL: We do not use a stainless steel control rod. We use a unique double guide assembly to prevent binding of the controls. The rod has a protective coating. We do not use stainless trim collars, we use highly polished aluminum. Our pump access door has only one "D" ring latch.

Page 11 of specifications, INSTRUMENTS AND CONTROLS: We will be supplying Class 1 gauges.

Page 11 of specifications, PUMP HOUR METER: A pump hour meter will be supplied, however it will be hooked to the air shift.

Page 12 of specifications, TANK OVERFLOW PIPING: A standard 4" overflow will be supplied as it conflicts with F in the previous heading THE BOOSTER TANK SHALL HAVE THE FOLLOWING FEATURES:.

Page 13 of specifications, HOSE BODY: We use 1/8" in lieu of 3/16 due to the fact that we use a bend a break construction technique. When making a radius in flat stock, the 1/8" has better bendability characteristics which in the long run of the truck being in service, will be less susceptible to metal fatigue caused by the flexing of the body. We use Dura-Dek in lieu of aluminum grate. Sample available upon request.

Page 14 of specifications, RUNNING BOARDS, REAR STEPS AND FENDERS: The treadplate overlay is 1/8" and is truly an overlay of the running board 1/8" for a full 1/4" surface thus eliminating the need for body stringers. We do not space the rear tailboard away from the body. We do not supply the treadplate around the fenders.

Page 14 of specifications, SCUFF AND KICKPLATES: The rear will be covered with treadplate, however we do not construct our apparatus with the traditional "beavertails".

Page 15 of specifications, SUB-STRUCTURE: See my proposal for my method(s) for this entire section as my style is different than what is specified.

Page 15 of specifications, POLISHED STAINLESS STEEL FENDERETTES: We do not offer stainless fenderettes, they will be polished aluminum.

Page 15 of specifications, ALUMINUM DIAMONDETTE SCUFF PLATES: We do not supply scuff plates as specified.

Page 15 of specifications, POLISHED STAINLESS STEEL RUB-RAILS: Our rub-rails are bright dip anodized aluminum.

Page 15/16 of specifications, COMPARTMENTS, 5052 H-32 SMOOTH ALUMINUM WITH EXTRUSIONS: A majority of the body I propose will be constructed of 1/8" aluminum. We use 1/8" in lieu of 3/16 due to the fact that we use a bend a break construction technique. When making a radius in flat stock, the 1/8" has better bendability characteristics which in the long run of the truck being in service, will be less susceptible to metal fatigue caused by the flexing of the body. The lower flanged area is smooth aluminum.

Page 18 of specifications, ELECTRICAL – COMMERCIAL CHASSIS: We use SVP Hot Shot rotating beacon for door open light.

Page 19 of specifications, UNDER THE HEADING FROM PREVIOUS PAGE, CLASS 1 TOTAL SYSTEM MANGER: The individual compartment lights do not have a switch. We are proposing a Collins CL-12 hand held light. We do not provide chromed clearance lights. We do not provide the Wesbar light as specified. The stanchions specified are not bid. The area under the light bar is not overlaid with treadplate.

Page 20 of specifications, WHELEN STOP-BACK-UP-DIRECTIONAL LIGHTS: We will supply Weldon 3700 series in a cast housing. The replacement cost of bulbs is considerably cheaper than the whelen specified.

Page 20 of specifications, REAR ARROW STICK DIRECTIONAL LIGHT: We will supply a Whelen traffic advisor.

Page 21 of specifications, MASTER DISCONNECT SWITCH WITH ISOLATOR: We use a Guest switch capable of the electrical load.

Page 21 of specifications, BATTERY ROLL-OUT TRAY: The batteries are not mounted on roll-out tray.

Page 21 of specifications, BATTERY CONDITIONER: We are not supplying the Koehler, we will be supplying the Kussmaul unit specified on page 22 of specifications.

Page 21 of specifications, ELECTRONIC SPEAKERS: We are supplying the non-angled speakers made by CPI.

Page 21 of specifications, ELECTRONIC BACK-UP ALARM: We will be supplying a PRECO variable type.

Page 21 of specifications, SIDE BODY WARNING AND SIGNAL LIGHTS: We are supplying Weldon.

Page 21 of specifications, GASOLINE GENERATOR: We are proposing a Honda 5000 watt.

Page 22 & 23 of specifications, FINISH: On the compartment interiors, we will supply line-x thermoplastic coating which is more durable than a splatter paint. Only one 4 oz. Bottle of touch up will be supplied.







### SCDOT Bicycle Policy Guidelines

It is the policy of the SCDOT to encourage and promote the use of bicycling as a form of transportation. The SCDOT recognizes that bicycles do provide a viable means of transportation that can enhance the environment and help conserve energy. The goal will be to increase the usage of bicycles by improving operating conditions for bicycle travel.

The SCDOT encourages each MPO/COG to adopt an official bicycle route plan as part of their regional or areawide transportation plan and to identify bicycle route improvement projects in their transportation improvement programs.

When an improvement is on a route that is part of an official MPO, COG or local jurisdiction bicycle plan or is part of a recognized statewide bicycle, scenic highway or tourism plan, the SCDOT and the affected local authorities will jointly determine the suitable improvements to accommodate bicycles.

When an improvement is on a route that is not part of an official bicycle plan but is located in an area or community having significant existing or projected bicycle usage, the SCDOT will coordinate with the local jurisdiction on the feasibility and suitability of providing improvements to accommodate bicycles.

The SCDOT will utilize the latest AASHTO "Guide for the Development of Bicycle Facilities" and the FHWA publication "Selecting Roadway Design Treatments to Accommodate Bicycles" to design bicycle facilities.

When a road is resurfaced and sufficient roadway width is available, consideration should be given to providing the appropriate traffic markings to accommodate bicycles.

The SCDOT will maintain bicycle facilities in accordance with the latest existing Department policies.

To provide a point of contact for assistance concerning the bicycle policy and programs the SCDOT has designated a bicycle and pedestrian coordinator.

SUBJECT: Warning Sign for "Share the Road with Bicyclists" (R9-8-24)

**BACKGROUND:** Even though bike paths, bike lanes, and roads with paved shoulders are gradually becoming more available for use by cyclists, the vast majority of bicycle travel has been, and will continue to be, on conventional streets and roadways that cyclists must share with motorists. In fact, one of the most promising changes for cyclists--the wide outside lane on multi-lane facilities--is dependent on the sharing of that lane by motorists and cyclists. The most common complaint of cyclists is that often motorists do not respect the cyclists' right (under S.C. Code 56-5-3420) to share the same roadway.

This guideline has been developed to provide a device that will serve to advise motorists of the law and their responsibility to act accordingly. The "Share the Road with Bicyclists" sign is for use in advising motorists that cyclists may be present (on the road posted) traveling in the same (or opposing) direction. This device will also serve to remind cyclists of their responsibility to be thoughtful of motorists who may be occasionally impeded by the cyclist's relatively slower speed. The W11-1 (Bicycle Crossing Sign) is still appropriate for situations where bicycle traffic crosses a road.

**GUIDELINE:** The "Share the Road with Bicyclists" sign may be used on facilities where there are no designated bicycle lanes, adjacent bicycle paths, or wide paved shoulders (at least 4 feet or 1.2m). This sign can be used on roads meeting any of the following conditions:

- observed bicycle traffic.
- a higher than normal potential for conflict between cyclists and motorists, such as at the end of designated bicycle lanes, or at narrow bridges (those with no shoulder).
- part of a formally adopted municipal, county, or the state bicycle route system.
- one or more documented bicycle/motor vehicle accidents.
- expected presence of number of cyclists, such as during an organized bicycle ride or event where the road will also continue to be open to motorists. (Under this condition, the signs should be mounted on portable type assemblies, to be in place only during the event.)
- where a traffic engineering study indicates a need for this type of sign.

It is generally inappropriate to use this sign along roadways with designated bicycle lanes or a usable parallel bicycle path.

When located on roads of the state system in accordance with this guideline, the responsibility for fabrication and erection shall be the same as for other regulatory signs.

The "Share the Road with Bicyclists" sign should be located in accordance with the standard practice for signs advising (warning) motorists of a condition requiring a high degree of judgment. For example, if much of the bicycle traffic on a road enters from an intersecting road, the sign should be located 750 feet in advance of that intersection (rural) or 250 feet in advance (urban).

The sign shall have the bicycle symbol in black on a yellow reflectorized background in the top portion of the panel, and the message "SHARE THE ROAD" in black on a white reflectorized background in the lower portion.
