
## III. NARRATIVE PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Project Title -Bringing Arts To The People/Adults with Disabilities Art Program

Description of project-Blue Ridge Art Center will demonstrate: Our motto of "Bringing Art to the People" with these programs that expose the underserved in our county to the arts and that are matters in Oconec County and should be accessible to everyone.

Our organization recognizes that are reflects life, depicts history, and contributes to the growth of the individual as well as the community. As the only an centur in the county, BRAC an integral part of the economic, social and educational visibility of Oconec County.

Our pilot grogram which was presented in August with 22 participants, four teachers and two students conducted an 8 class program for two weeks with supplies privately donated. During the Open House and reception, families, friends. Tribble staff, administration and clients were abviously moved to see the artwork in a professional atmosphere. Clients were provided with community exposure

The program was an overwhelming success, the first of its kind in the area, and a chance for those with disabilities to feel included. Everything was done by BRAC volunteers at no cost to the participants. BRAC would like to give more adults with disabilities a chance to experience creative self expression. We have developed a visual art program to done in dedicated classrooms with certified teachers/ artists with the intent of art leading to support and self employment where participants can sell their work. To do this we will need funding for art supplies, building operations and salaries.

The participants and children through-out the area will also be given the opportunity to be involved in the Santas Workshop, Brac Events and shows and Upcycling Art Event, participate in mural project and extensive "Make and Take" and "Upcycling" that BRAC volunteers are planning for local events.

In order facilitate these projects, funding for basic supplies for these efforts will be required.

Who will benefit: Adults with disabilities will benefit along with their families, the community, city & county. Area businesses and hotels will benefit as friends come to see the art work. The far reaching benefits will begin when the participants can begin selling their work at a gift shop, local events, area businesses, and online.

Area children and adults participating in Make and Take and Mural projects will begin to associate these activities with our local events thereby increasing attendance as people seek out family friendly activities. Our cat mural, now available at Seneca City Hall and our website for viewing is a great example of the popularity of this type of art.

## How will the project influence an appreciation of the Arts and/or History in Oconee County?

There are over 600 people with disabilities affiliated with the Tribble Center, and also in the ARC program. With experienced teachers in the special needs are we will be able to include many of these in the program. Family and friends will attend events, many from out of town which will benefit the county, and also give them the opportunity to appreciate that art can be for everyone and those with disabilities can contribute to the art world and a be a part of the art community. This program will be a first for the county and with news coverage, online coverage, and word of mouth it will be well publicized. Our proposed Fall and Winter Classes and a PowerPoint of pilot class and exhibit photos were presented to the State Disabilities and Special Needs Department in Columbia, SC by Mr. Jerry Mize-Executive Director/Tribble Center, on August 28, 2015. Senator Thomas Alexander has provided continual support and is integral in our pursuit of options to extend this program.

Through public outreach art programs such as community murals and Make and Take projects, BRAC increases awareness, educates and exposes a wide variety of people from all walks of life to the arts and culture in Oconee County.

## How many people benefited from the project last year and are anticipated this year?

We had 22 disabled artists participants in our pilot program and almost all of those in the day treatment program and expect 30 for this round. There are hundreds of people affiliated with Tribble that could be a part of an extraordinary program. Because of various disabilities, class size is limited. 295 total art participants for make and takes/murals and reception last session. Our expectation is to double this number.

Exposure for Tribble and the excitement surrounding the event benefitted the entire center and its 600+ clients and staff. The artwork that was returned after the reception is now enjoyed by staff and residents alike.

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### Outline:

We would like to develop additional educational and entertaining exhibits utilizing material we have in our current collection and supplementing that with the professionally designed display panels, printed media, and archaeological artifacts from the now closed Keowee-Toxaway Museum in order to help explain the history of the Cherokee in our area and the part they played on the frontier in South Carolina during the formative years of our country. An important part of this project would involve the construction of new custom display cases in order to expand our display area into our newly acquired adjacent building.

## Need and urgency of the project:

Our museum has been very fortunate in acquiring artifacts and expanding our collections since our opening a little over a year ago. Recently, two simultaneous events have given us the opportunity to expand our exhibit space four-fold and increase our interpretative collection at the same time.

In the first instance, Oconee County Council voted to donate to us a vacated county-owned building adjacent to our museum. This two story brick building had been constructed in 1959 to house the county treasurer's office as well as other county departments. It is very solid and structurally sound, but is no longer needed by the county due to the recent construction of new county facilities.

In the second instance, South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism offered us their complete museum display now in storage at Keowee-Toxaway State Park relating to the Cherokee Indians in upstate South Carolina. This collection includes priceless historical archaeological artifacts from the site of Fort Prince George as well as the Cherokee village of Keowee. These sites were excavated by the South Carolina Department of Archaeology and Anthropology, and the artifacts were inventoried and preserved prior to the inundation of Lake Keowee by Duke Energy in 1968. Initially these artifacts and interpretive materials had been displayed in a museum and four kiosks at Keowee-Toxaway State Park, but were put into storage several years ago due to state budget cuts and reduction of park staff. In order to capitalize on this opportunity, we must construct new custom display cases to accommodate our expanded collection.

## How the project will benefit Oconee County:

A great deal of regional and national support has already been expressed in our museum's progress due in part to our website (<a href="www.cherokeemuseumsc.org">www.cherokeemuseumsc.org</a>), brochures, newspaper articles, Facebook page, and word-of-mouth. Due to the fact that our facility is the only museum in the state of South Carolina dedicated to our Native American heritage, other Native American groups and individuals have donated time and artifacts to help make this museum a success. The primary goal of our project is to educate the public and create a better understanding of the rich and diverse history of South Carolina in relation to the Cherokee, and their interaction with non-native cultures. The four-fold enlargement of our storage and exhibit area as well as the acquisition of the Keowee-Toxaway Museum collection will greatly enhance our interpretation of our county's rich history.

The success of this project will be measured by the number of visitors to the museum, but also by the knowledge they take with them as measured and evaluated by a voluntary feedback form.

Cultural and heritage tourism travelers—including visitors to museums— spend 63 percent more than other leisure travelers and tend to stay longer than other tourists, according to data from the U.S. Cultural & Heritage Tourism Marketing Council.

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis finds that arts and cultural production constitutes 4.3 percent of the nation's entire economy, a \$698 billion industry. The U.S. Conference of Mayors has recognized that "the arts, humanities and museums are critical to the quality of life and livability of America's cities." For every \$1 invested by governments in museums and other cultural institutions, \$7 is returned in tax revenues.



## III. NARRATIVE PROJECT DESCRIPTION

A. Project Title: OHC Touchscreen Kiosks

**B. Description of project:** Oconee Heritage Center will purchase the computers and software necessary to create 2 touchscreen kiosks. One kiosk will be placed in our Walhalla museum location and the other in the General Store Museum in Westminster. These kiosks will allow visitors to access digitized historic photos and documents (those not currently available in the exhibits), as well as original video and audio content pertinent to Oconee history. The software to be purchased can be updated by OHC staff whenever new content becomes available or when old content becomes obsolete. The software operates in such a way as to prohibit any unauthorized use of the computers. The OHC will purchase supplies and provide the necessary labor needed to build stands or enclosures for the kiosks (or wall mounting if space prohibits free-standing kiosks). OHC may also purchase a third kiosk specifically to supplement textile history using funds currently earmarked for textile heritage preservation and promotion. This will be a great addition to our current museums and their displays. The kiosks will allow for the addition of much more content without requiring more physical space. Likewise, the incorporation of technology will appeal to today's 21st-century visitors. We prefer the use of streamlined touchscreen kiosks with interactive software over bulky tv/dvd/computer set-ups limited to video or photo loops. The

- kiosks will take up less space, be more user-friendly, require less maintenance, and will allow for a greater variety of interactive and selectable content. If approved for funding we should be able to have the kiosks available to visitors by Spring 2016.
- C. Who will benefit from this project? All visitors to the Oconee Heritage Center and the OHC General Store Museum will have access to the kiosks during normal visiting hours and during special tour appointments.

## VI. DEMOGRAPHIC DATA

How will the project influence an appreciation for the Arts and/or History in Oconee County? The addition of touchscreen kiosks to our museum locations will provide greater historical content and interpretation for all visitors. Many 21<sup>st</sup>-century visitors appreciate history when presented in new formats (audio/video), especially when they can interact with familiar technology. The kiosks will allow visitors to specifically explore supplemental material for topics that are new or specifically of interest to them.
