


Cost of Living



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




OCCUPATION GROWTH 2018-2028



Oconee County Local ATAX Collections




State ATAX collections (FY2018 vs FY2017)




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

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Signature Accomplishments

Tri-County Technical College – Oconee Campus

The **Tri-County Technical College Oconee Workforce Campus** opened in August 2018 with nearly 200 enrolled students. The campus, located inside the Oconee Industry and Technology Park, will serve as a pathway for students to enter into manufacturing focused careers. The result, is a unique center for technical education, work-based learning, and economic development unseen anywhere thus far in the southeast. This is an innovative new model which has opened the doors for discussions on partnerships, operational pieces, and pathways that generate great success for students.

Top 10 Economic Development Project in South Carolina

Driving South Carolina's Silver Shovel is largely the state's ever-growing automotive sector. With that, an Oconee County automotive expansion project landed among **South Carolina's top 10 economic development projects for 2017.** BorgWarner, Inc. ranked as the state's 9th top economic development project, with an announcement of 160 new jobs and \$71.9 million in capital investment.

Destination Oconee

Destination Oconee: Realizing the Future of Oconee County is a tourism based economic development strategy designed to showcase and build upon the natural assets of Oconee County. The goal of **Destination Oconee** is to drive initiatives that enhance the local economic climate while continuing to make the area one of the leading tourism destinations in South Carolina. In September 2018, the first of 125 way-finding signs was installed to create more visible signage and improve the efficiency of travel throughout our county for both natives and visitors.

NOW, Nurturing Oconee's Workforce, is a unique program designed to prepare Oconee students for tomorrow's jobs. The NOW program was created in partnership with the School District of Oconee County to ensure students enter the workforce ready and marketable to employers. In May 2018, the 18 students of the inaugural class of the NOW program graduated with an **employment advantage**, including industry exposure, and networking opportunities. Several students graduated with internships, part-time, or full-time employment with Oconee County's top manufacturing employers including: BorgWarner, ITT, I Tech South, Just Aircraft, Sandvik, Itron, and Koyo Bearings.

Think Oconee

Think Oconee, a marketing campaign created to localize spending and deepen connections within the community has grown into a way of life. With thousands of people sharing the Think Oconee message, it has flourished into the unwritten motto of Oconee County, spreading its wings beyond local spending. Think Oconee launched its new website, thinkoconee.com, where people can connect with local business partners, keep up with community activities, find Think Oconee merchandise, discover Oconee adventure locations, and so much more. The website launch included a two minute video highlighting some of what Oconee has to offer for people of all ages and walks of life when it comes to thinking about home, growth, and adventure.

Expert: entrepreneurship 'a community sport

WALHALLA — An officer of a nonprofit, multi-billion-dollar endowment from the Midwest stopped at the Oconee Business Center in Walhalla on Thursday to take a tour of its business incubator for local entrepreneurs.

"It seems like there's a groundswell of energy supporting entrepreneurship across the state," Kauffman Foundation senior program officer in ecosystem development Andy Stoll said. "I would encourage everyone to double down on that activity. It truly comes down to entrepreneurship is a community sport, that it takes all of us to support and encourage entrepreneurs. There seems to be a groundswell, and I don't want to lose that momentum away — that would be my takeaway."

The Kauffman Foundation was founded in 1966 by Ewing Marion Kauffman, who in addition to his nonprofit work is also the namesake of the Kansas City Royals' stadium.

"He deeply believed that the people who do the work should get paid," Stoll said. "Our foundation is his legacy, and we work to support education in Kansas City and in entrepreneurship nationally. We spend a lot of time thinking of how you can foster a community that can support and encourage entrepreneurs."

Visiting the Upstate this week, Stoll made the trek

from Greenville to the business incubator in Walhalla.

"What's great about this region is that you actually have a center," he told three of the tenants located in the incubator. "What we think a lot about are the things needed in a community to support entrepreneurship, because entrepreneurs can live anywhere. I always say that geography doesn't have a monopoly on good ideas, and what I mean by that is that not

all the smart people live in Silicon Valley, New York and Boston. They live in Wichita, rural South Carolina and upstate Maine."

Oconee Economic Alliance director of small buşiness development Dave Eldridge helped orchestrate Stoll's visit.

"This is one of the largest private foundations Eldridge said. "They have a \$2 billion net worth and they're from Kansas City. When he retired, he set up this foundation to work on two different types of projects in the United States.

"One is projects that are improving education, and the other is development of entrepreneurship, and that's why one of his executives has been in the Upstate for the last two go to incubators of different types. We're in a rural county, and he wanted to come somewhere that it was more rural."

The incubator program is something that will eventually allow entrepreneurs to "hatch" into the economy, according to Eldridge.

"Oconee County saw the vision for what we were doing, so they let us use this building, and in for a very cheap rate and follow the business incubator for three to four years," he said. "They get internet, they get fax, they get conference rooms and office space. Hopefully by the end of three years they have 'hatched' from the incubator economy and can go into the local economy. We've had probably six different businesses graduate and move out to the local economy." One of the tenants at the business incubator was grateful for the program.

"I think we'd be graduating from the facility in two years," Dana Todd of Vermon NDT said. "They let people stay here for three years, but I expect it'll be two years and we'll grow out of the space. The program is really good."

Prior to meeting with Stoll, Eldridge estimated that 200 jobs could be credited to the incubator.

"T'm looking forward to exposing him to what "... we're doing here on a small" budget," he said. "We've creeated, probably, in Oconee County over the last three years, over 200 jobs that weren't here before. We can range anywhere from four to 10 businesses at any time. We're currently at six."

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
