

OCONEE TOWN

Oconee, also spelled "Aconnee," was one of the Cherokee "Lower Towns" in what is now S. C. At the base of Oconee Mountain and on the main trading path between the British and Cherokees, it was abandoned in 1752. Oconee Station was built in 1792 as an outpost where the path crossed the Cherokee boundary. This county, created from Pickens District in 1868, was named for Oconee Town.

Oconee Town: a brief background

Oconee, in the northwestern corner of South Carolina, was one of the "lower towns" of the Cherokee nation. The Cherokee villages in South Carolina were lower in topographic elevation than the villages in the mountains of North Carolina and Tennessee, and were also closer to early pioneer settlements. Oconee was situated at the base of the Blue Ridge mountain escarpment and was the last of the lower towns to be passed through before crossing the mountains traveling from east to west on the Cherokee trading path between Charles Town and the Mississippi River.

There are at least twelve known variations in the spelling of the name "Oconee." As with the names of all early Cherokee towns, the English spelling was derived phonetically from local pronunciation. It seems possible that the great variety of spellings used by early journalists and mapmakers in writing the names of Cherokee towns resulted from varying pronunciation by different individuals or groups within the Cherokee complex.

Although the earliest written reference to Oconee Town was in the Francis Varnod census of Cherokee towns in 1721, there is much evidence available to demonstrate that it was inhabited much earlier. An archaeological survey conducted by the South Carolina Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology in 1972, and a recent (2009) archaeological excavation indicates that it was used as a seasonal campsite for thousands of years before it was a settlement. In 1730, Sir Alexander Cuming recorded that upon his arrival at Oconee there was "a Solemnity performing in the Town-House." The fact that Oconee had a town house (or council house) is indicative of Oconee's important standing, for the smaller villages did not have town houses.

The generations-long war between the Creeks and Cherokees burst into increased violence in the early 1750s with the consequence of most of the Cherokee lower towns being abandoned. Oconee was abandoned in 1752, never again to be reoccupied on a permanent basis. Its name, however, had been applied to the nearby mountain, and because the site of the town was on the main road to the important overhill town of Chota, it continued to be known for years to come.

When British Col. James Grant's army fought the Cherokees in 1761, his army camped for one night at the abandoned site of Oconee. Among the young soldiers serving under him on this expedition were Thomas Middleton, Henry Laurens, Andrew Williamson, Isaac Huger, Andrew Pickens, Thomas Sumter, William Moultrie, and Francis Marion, all of whom later played major roles in the American Revolution.

The noted botanist William Bartram in 1775 mentioned seeing "the ruins of the ancient Oconee Town." In 1792, a frontier outpost was constructed adjacent to the village site and was named "Oconee Station". When the War Between the States began in 1861, a unit of volunteers from this area adopted the name "Oconee Rifles." Later, when Pickens District was divided into two counties in 1868, the section west of the Keowee River was named "Oconee County."

The historic site of Oconee Town, the ancient Cherokee village that Oconee County was named for, was recently purchased through the combined efforts of the Museum of the Cherokee in South Carolina, Naturaland Trust, Oconee Forever, and Upstate Forever.

Oconee Town was an important Cherokee village in the mid-18th century, located on the Cherokee trading path and situated about halfway between Keowee Town and Chattooga River. It stood at the base of Oconee Mountain and was at the intersection of the trading path and the Cherokee treaty line of 1777.

The village was destroyed by the Creek Indians in 1752 and was abandoned that year, but the ruins of Oconee Town were still evident in May of 1775 when William Bartram passed through the area: "...I began to ascend the Oconne mountain. On the foot of the hills are the ruins of the ancient Oconne Town" (Bartram's Journal, part 3, chapter 3). During the British-Cherokee War, the site was used as a military campsite in the expeditions of both Col. Montgomery in 1760, and Col. Grant in their campaigns against the Cherokee.

In 1792, Oconee Station was constructed next to the site of Oconee Town and was named accordingly. Later, Oconee County was named for Oconee Town when it was formed in 1868.

The 53.6 acre site, which is adjacent to Oconee Station, will be donated to the South Carolina Department of Parks and Recreation and will become an important part of Oconee Station State Historic Site.

'Oconee Town' Cherokee Village Acquired; Will Be Added To Park

Just in time for Oconee County's upcoming Sesquicentennial (150th year) Celebration in 2018, the site of the Cherokee village that the county was named for—Oconee Town—has been purchased through the combined effort of four organizations, and will be added onto the adjacent Oconee Station State Historic Site.

The organizations that purchased the 53.6-acre site from a private owner are the Museum of the Cherokee in South Carolina, Naturaland Trust, Oconee Forever, and Upstate Forever. They will donate the site to the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism (PRT), which will assume management.

"We've been working on this for years, and we finally got it done," said Luther Lyle, Director/Curator of the Cherokee Museum.

Lyle said the land is forested and there are no remnants of the Cherokee village. However, he said there are plans to construct a trail to the site and he is hopeful that, in the future, some replicas will be constructed, depicting what the village would have looked like.

There is already a historical marker, providing a brief history of Oconee (also spelled "Aconnee") Town, at Oconee Station State Historic Site. Lyle oversaw the placement of that marker in 2006. The marker notes that Oconee Town was one of the Cherokee "lower towns" in

what is now South Carolina.

Lyle provided the following, more extensive, history of Oconee Town to the Keowee Courier:

Oconee Village Site Land Transfer To State Park System Is Celebrated

The Museum of the Cherokee in South Carolina sponsored an event at Oconee State Park on Friday, Sept. 1 to celebrate the acquisition of the site of the ancient Cherokee village of Oconee, which is adjacent to Oconee Station State Historic Site and will become incorporated into the South Carolina park system.

Special guests at the celebration were the third grade classes from Walhalla Elementary School, who were entertained by and danced with the Cherokee Deer Clan Warriors from

Cherokee, N.C.

Nadia Dean, author and film producer, and two third grade girls, Charlotte Conway and Sage Singer, were selected to participate in a Native American "Wampum Belt" ceremony, which symbolically made the transfer of the land official and was the highlight of the event.

Among the dignitaries who spoke at the event were Rev. Taylor Todd, Lonza Lyle who is Director/Curator of the Museum of the Cherokee in South Carolina, Principal Chief Richard Stued of the Eastern Band

of Cherokee Indians, Cherokee Elder/Beloved Man Jerry Wolfe, Hugh Lambert of the Museum of the Cherokee in South Carolina, Frank Holloman of Naturaland Trust, Brad Wyche of Upstate Forever, and State Park Director Phil Gaines.

"The Cherokee village site had been a part of the Todd family farm since the 1700's, but after several years of negotiations, the family members agreed to sell the land to Naturaland Trust

with funding provided by the South Carolina Conservation Bank and a conservation easement being held by Upstate Forever," said Lonza Lyle, Director/Curator of the Museum of the Cherokee in South Carolina. "Because of its location on the British/Cherokee Trading Path, Oconee village had been the scene of many historical events over the past several hundred years," Lyle added. "When Oconee County was created in 1868 it was named after Oconee town because of its important place in South Carolina history."

Director Riley,

I am pleased to write to you today in support of our County's Application for the FY18/19 Justice Assistance Equipment Grant. Through this funding and support of this grant, Oconee County's Sheriff Office will replace aging security systems such as access control system and Video surveillance system. This will enhance and upgrade safety measures using newer technology and software. This will provide a safer environment at the Oconee County Sheriff's Office for personnel, citizens, equipment and sensitive data. The funding will also help with highway safety by equipping the Oconee County Sheriff's Office Patrol Units with speed enforcement radars in an effort to save lives on our roadways. The county supports these efforts and is prepared to commit a total cash match not to exceed 10% by the county and the Oconee County Sheriff's Office.

Over the past five years the Sheriff's Office has spent thousands of dollars trying to maintain the access control system and video surveillance system. These systems are past their end of life and are no longer supported by maintenance or licensing agreements. These systems will need to be replaced with new systems due to no longer being manufactured.

Highway safety will always be a major concern. This calendar year alone Oconee Sheriff's Office records show over 1600 reckless driving complaints and over 1500 motor vehicle accidents. Equipping our officers with speed detection radar can help make our roadways safer.

I would like to express my support with the Oconee County Sheriff's Office in seeking out grant funds to make our Law Enforcement Center a safe and secure place for all and efforts to improve safety on our roadways.



Death Investigation Protocol

- SECNAVINST 5430.107 – Mission and Functions of the Naval Criminal Investigative Service
- “NCIS shall investigate...any non-combat death, on or off naval installations, facilities, vessels, or aircraft, where the cause of death cannot be medically attributable to disease or natural causes...NCIS shall investigate the circumstances until criminal causality can be reasonably excluded.”



Death Investigation Protocol

Every case is treated with the same diligence as a homicide --

- Prevents destruction or loss of valuable evidence at the scene and loss of important information from witnesses

Death Investigation Protocol

- Medical Examiner determines cause and manner of death
- NCIS investigates circumstances surrounding the death
- NCIS presents results to medical, command and/or prosecutors for action deemed appropriate



Death Investigation Protocol

Timeline:

- Initial notification to duty agent and assignment of case agent
- Death scene MCRT response and review by Forensic Consultant
- Investigation and worldwide pursuit of all logical investigative leads
- Autopsy/Pathologist consult
- Family interviews and Family Liaison contact
- NCIS Field Office Death Review Panel
- NCIS HQ Death Review Board
- Authorization to close



Death Investigation Protocol

NCIS Death Scene Responders

NCIS Special Agents

- Training at FLETC and advanced crime scene training

Major Case Response Team (MCRT)

- Advanced training and evidence collection equipment
- Extensive death scene examination, measurements, photography, videotaping and gathering and packaging of evidence

NCIS Forensic Consultants

- Masters Degrees in Forensics
- Consult with MCRTs on every death scene and review the physical evidence in every death case



Death Investigation Protocol-Suspected Suicide

- Mandatory interviews of family, witnesses, friends, etc.
- Review of 911 calls
- Review of death scene examination by MCRT
- Review of cyber evidence
- Review of all records (service, medical, psychological, emergency room and ambulance)
- Criminal History: Data base checks
- Sworn statements obtained from witnesses



Death Investigation Protocol-Suspected Suicide Investigative Steps (cont.)

- All logical leads are pursued worldwide
- Role of NCIS Forensic Psychologist
- Consultation with outside experts – U.S. Army Criminal Investigative Laboratory (USACIL), Armed Forces Institute of Pathology (AFIP), and other state, local and federal agencies
- NCIS HQ Death Desk Officers monitor the case and interact with the case control agent



Suicide Prevention

NCIS participates with DON and USMC in Suicide Prevention activities to include the NCIS Crime Reduction Campaigns which proactively bring public awareness to problems with the goal of prevention

NCIS is currently participating with two USN and one USMC study on suicide and suicide prevention.



Death Investigation Protocol

Suspected Suicide – Autopsy

NCIS Special Agents work closely with Pathologist and Medical Examiners who conduct the autopsy

- Attend the autopsy and provide scene photos, evidence and personal records to MEs at autopsy
- Autopsy photos are obtained for the case file
- Agents obtain the final autopsy report and final death certificate
- Outside agency reports may be referred to AFIP for consult and opinion



Death Investigation Protocol

Suspected Suicide – NCIS Family Liaison Coordinator

- Specially trained Licensed Clinical Social Worker
- Point of contact for family on all questions and information regarding the death investigation

Death Investigation Protocol

Suspected Suicide – FOIA and Privacy Act

Background:

- Death cases routinely take one year or more to close-FOIA requests may take an additional two to three months to complete following closure
- FOIA requests
 - Executed to the letter of the law
 - Privacy and document control



NCIS Family Liaison Program

- **Background:**
 - NCIS Establishes Family Liaison Policy (1994)
 - DoD Instruction 5505.10 (1996)
 - Mandates establishment of Family Liaison Program

- **Purpose:**
 - To ensure all reasonable questions and issues raised by the family are addressed on a timely basis

NCIS Family Liaison Program (cont.)

- **Application**
 - Family liaison involvement is appropriate when a military victim dies from an apparent suicide, an accident, or when the manner of death is undetermined.
- **Benefits**
 - Minimize problems or misinformation which can result in the perception of a cover-up or conspiracy
 - Provide a consistent Point of Contact



NCIS Family Liaison Program (cont.)

- **Functions:**
 - **Agent Support:**
 - Keep field agent apprised of relevant concerns expressed by the family
 - Assist coordination of family interview
 - **Family Advocate:**
 - Provide grief assistance and support
 - Assists family in understanding the investigative process and temper expectations accordingly
 - Provide case status updates


