#### **STATISTICS**

- In the 2011-2012 school year, 5200 students dropped out of high school in South Carolina
- Studies show that an average of 75% of dropouts commit crimes
- Studies show that 25% of youth frequently engage in behaviors that produce negative consequences, such as alcohol or drugs.
- Only 3 out of 10 youth ages 6 to 17 play sports on a regular basis (one to two sports per year).\*
- Families earning less than \$35,000 per year do not start their youth in sports until age 8, compared to families making over \$100,000 per year who start their youth at the average age of 6. This affects their physical preparedness to continue sports and they tend to quit playing by the time they start middle school.\*

## How Does Oconee Leadership for Life WORK?

We will provide additional resource officers for schools within Oconee County to offer students training as well as be an advocate for at-risk students to help them reach their full potential academically, socially, and physically.

Through various activities and programs designed to challenge students and encourage them to thrive and realize their dreams, this program will have a devoted staff who will work with students and create a positive environment for them to excel and give them a stepping stone for success.

#### PHASE I

- Create an Pl Unit Prevention and Intervention team at the Oconee County Sheriff's Office.
   This would consists of a director with preferably a masters degree/educational background along with an administrative assistant.
- Develop Curriculum (ABCD, Think Smart, Badges for Baseball, etc. Reach for your dreams— Warren County, Ky.)
- Explore grants and other funding opportunities Admin. Assistant could serve all county departments with grant opportunities
- Partner with the School District, decide on available locations
- Communicate with community leaders, parents, coaches, and teachers about the program
  to help identify the appropriate youth that would benefit the most.
- Develop an operational plan to address transportation needs to after school program.
- Establish partnerships with business community and athletic community
- The first focus will be on one sport:
- Add at least one elementary school resource officer.
- Approximate Initial Costs Initial \$225,000.00 = 3 salaries with fringe and two vehicles

#### Phase II

- Advance/move SRO to full form eventually having at least one for every two schools
- Approximate Initial Costs \$85,000.00 per school resource officer.
   This includes salary, fringe, and vehicle


Begin after school curriculum - Use existing programs such as (but not limited to):


#### **TESTIMONIALS**



We have enjoyed having Officer Mulwee in our classroom. He has been inspirational to all the students in my class, but especially one student. #### REQUESTS FROM OUR COUNTY

- Fair-Oak has 8 10 girls that could use strong, positive female direction! And a few more that would benefit.
- I would like to ask for your assistance in the possibility of securing a mentor for female students at the elementary school level. I know that Oakway Intermediate School specifically has at least 2, if not 4, female students that would benefit greatly from having contact on a regular weekly basis. I feel if a female officer were able to meet students and establish these regular contacts and positive relationships with female students, that we would see a decrease in the number of truancy and behavioral concerns. Officer Mulwee has made a huge impact in the elementary schools and I feel that a female could do the same.

#### **Expected Outcomes**

- Reduced number of youth going to jail due to drug violations.
- Strong character, stronger leaders, vibrant communities.
- Improved social skills
- Fewer student conduct cases in the public school system.
- Create a safe environment where the youth can grow and learn new skills to become successful citizens.
- Create activities such as athletic programs that will help them grow as an individual and give them a firm foundation to build on.
- Increased academic performance in school by offering resources such as tutoring and study areas to do their homework.
- Reduced drop-out rates
- Increased student retention and graduation rates.
- Wellness programs will be offered for a healthier mind, body, experience.
- Decrease crime and gang related activities

#### Final Thoughts

- The initial program hopes to reach 200 youth.
- The initial costs of \$200,000.00 + equals about \$1,000.00 per person
- If we invest approximately \$1,000.00 in one of our youth, we hopefully give them the opportunity to achieve their full potential
- When we do nothing, we end up spending tens of thousands of dollars dealing with them in our criminal justice system

This moment is exciting for me. It is exciting to be able to share the resources that Christ Central Ministries Oconee can offer the families and individuals of Oconee County.

Christ Central Ministries Oconee is a mission station under the umbrella of Christ Central Ministries which is based out of Columbia and has been in existence since 1997. Christ Central Ministries was designed to meet the visible needs of Columbia and the surrounding areas. With the first mission station based in Columbia S.C. to having now at this present time 39 different locations working with visible needs in the community it is based in.

For example Christ Central has 500 beds throughout South Carolina. These beds are in different counties with in transitional housing for men and women, Recovery programs for men and women, and in emergency homeless shelters.

Christ Central also offers Career and life skills technical college, community development, GED training/testing, missional training, and free Medical care in optical, dental, and general medicine. Christ Central Ministries has the only State Certified faith based addiction recovery program in the state of South Carolina.

Christ Central Ministries is designed to work in communities with the local Community individual, church, commerce, Government, and Education.

All of these resources are offered through Christ Central Ministries Oconee based here in Walhalla. We have been helping the visible needs in Oconee for the past 6 years. In the past 6 years we have helped by either handing out a free lunch on Saturdays behind hometown groceries, helping 150 individuals to receive their GED for free, and to helping the addicted individual and family to find the help they need to live a purposeful and productive life free from drugs and alcohol.

The Men's Recovery program, Ash Tree, has been in operation since June 2012. We are a state certified faith based program. We intertwine secular teaching with faith based material to help the individual that is dealing with unhealthy life issues.

Knowing the opportunity to use the old jail we can provide many programs that will help the families of Oconee County.

There are visible needs to be met that this facility can be used for.

An Emergency homeless shelter is vital. There would be locations in each town that a person can come to at a certain time to be picked up and carried for a overnight stay. This person would come into the facilities and be evaluated, asked questions about their needs, tell them about resources that would benefit them, and let them know that they have the opportunity to change their life. The individual would be given a meal and a place to sleep. After wakeup call

everyone in the emergency shelter would be transported back to the location that they were picked up at. They would not have the opportunity to stay around facilities during the day if they were in the emergency homeless shelter.

Another area of interest for the facility is to house men and women in the beginning stages of the recovery program. The beginning stages, or stabilization, is two months. During this time we are able to work with the client to help them to get grounded and focused on the recovery process.

During the day there will be recovery classes held, classes on building healthy boundaries, finance classes, and discipleship classes.

Other classes that will be offered is Jobs for life, Rebuild Real Men, women's mentoring groups, parenting classes, job training, culinary art skills, and free GED training and testing.

The facility is a great place to use for all of the resources that can be provided. There is plenty of room for the different levels of programs, teaching and resources to help individuals in Oconee County.

This resource will give individuals another choice instead of doing what they have always done.

Over the past 6 years Christ Central Ministries has been part of Oconee helping individuals find housing, recovery, job training, and education. Because of the space limitations in our facility here in Walhalla we have had to send men and women to Columbia for recovery programs. There have been approximately 30 clients that have been in the recovery programs in Columbia from Oconee County. I believe it would be great to have the resource for more beds and programming to help meet these needs right here in our own community. People can find the resource they need without leaving there families. This would be a great opportunity for Oconee County.

#### our history and our future

The Ash Tree has been in operation since June 2012. Christ Central Ministries Oconee is a Mission Station of Christ Central Ministries. A Mission Station deals with particular needs within a community.

Christ Central Ministries Oconee received property located at 203 Hunter Avenue, Walhalia June 2013 after an unknown donor heard the need to establish a men's recovery support program in Oconee County. The individual's brother was a wellknown business man in Walhalia who fell to alcoholism. Out of the need that was present for families in Oconee County this house was given to CCM Oconee to impact lives in our community, The property was bought out of foreclosure which had been vacant for six years, Over the years neglect to the upkeep of the property caused foundation, cosmetic, wiring, code and various unseen problems.

Over the past two years we have been fortunate to help several individuals to receive tools to stay sober, helped them to receive their GED, and to find stable employment.



- We are facing a drug epidemic in Oconee and CCMO wants to be prepared to help the need.
- In the year 2012 there were 355 recorded meth labs or dumpsites in S.C.
- In 2012 our area was 2nd in admission for meth. From 2011 to 2012 there was a 31.6% increase in meth use, and our area was 1st in admission for cocaine use. In 2012 there was an increase of 34.1% from the previous year.

The Ash Tree partners with local organizations like ReBuild to provide full-time mentoring services for every candidate. We are always looking for male mentors.

Stewardship is also critical as we have multiple projects in the men's house that need attention as well as expenses incurred to provide teaching, counseling, and recovery work.

Transitional Housing options for graduated candidates that complete their 10-month program are always needed. Our partner, Families Fighting Addiction, also needs resource and financial support as we work hard to provide a network of TLC for families experiencing the trauma, loss, and / or recovevery of a loved one due to substance abuse and addiction.





#### INTRODUCTION

The state of South Carolina has an abundance of water resources with 8,000 miles of rivers, 460,000 acres of lakes, and 3,000 miles of coastline. Whether it is fishing, water-skiing, hunting or pleasure boating, these resources are used every day by thousands of recreational boaters. Currently there are 465,805 recreational motorboats registered in South Carolina with thousands of new boats being registered every year.

In 1973 there were sixty-four fatalities as a result of recreational boating accidents. That year there were only 128,000 boats registered in this state. An increase in law enforcement personnel, better laws like the Boating Safety Act of 1996, Drew's Law, and concentrated boating education classes statewide have teamed up in an effort to reduce the number of accidents and fatalities.

The information found in this report is useful in our Boating Safety Education program as a background for stressing facts relating to careless boat operation. This information helps to impress upon each student the importance of safe boating and shows that accidents do in fact happen.

This report is published by the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources, Law Enforcement Investigations Section. Copies are made available to personnel in the department, the news media, and concerned individuals whose efforts will make boating not only safe but enjoyable.

#### ACCIDENT REPORTING

When a person operating a boat on the waters of South Carolina is involved in a reportable accident, they are required to notify the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources. Accidents involving injury or loss of life must be reported within 48 hours; accidents in all other cases are required to be reported within 10 days. Any person violating these requirements is liable to a penalty of not more than \$100.00 for each violation.

Any of the following constitutes a reportable boating accident:

- A. Loss of life
- B. Injuries Incapacitating a person for more than 24 hours
- C. Injuries rendering a person unconscious.
- D. Injuries requiring medical treatment.
- E. Physical damage to boats or real property in excess of \$2,000.00.

All boating accident reports are forwarded to the Law Enforcement Investigations section where they are reviewed by designated personnel for completeness and accuracy. Reports that are incomplete or lack pertinent information are returned with an explanation of what additional information is needed. The primary and secondary causes of the accident are determined by the information given in the report. Copies of all "reportable accident" reports are forwarded to the United States Coast Guard.


### Vessels Operation at Time of Accident

### **SUMMARY**

In 1971 the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department began investigating accidents and keeping records. The first year, with 79,804 registered boats, there were 85 reported accidents with 45 fatalities. In 2009, South Carolina had its lowest year of fatalities on record with 11.

In 2013 there were 108 accidents reported to the Law Enforcement Investigation Section, which included 28 fatalities and 58 injuries. There were 68 non-reportable boating incidents, 2 fatal medical incident, 2 commercial fatalities, and 1 non-reportable fatality.

Boating accidents occurred in every month. Fifty percent of all accidents occurred on Saturday and Sunday. Sixty percent occurred between the hours of 12:01pm and 8:00pm. In seventy eight percent of all accidents, the operator was twenty years of age or older. There was a case made in twenty seven percent of all accidents.

Collisions, ranks as the number one type of accident. Capsizing I Falls overboard ranks as the number one type of fatal accident. The majority of accidents are the result of No Proper Lookout. There were 108 recreational boating accidents, with 19 percent involving Personal Watercraft.
